To All Mountain View Homeowners:

About a week ago, I contacted Eric Heffner, from Bridge Investment Group, to see if they had an update for us about the golf course situation. He said they would be starting this week trimming the palm trees and mowing the grass. He assured me the work included the Valley 9. True to his word, on the date of our last board meeting, we saw them working on the palm trees. Unfortunately, that is all of the information I have right now.

If you have concerns about health and/or safety resulting from the Valley 9 property, we are suggesting that you call the city code enforcement for assistance. The number for Code Compliance and Weed Abatement is 951-413-3340.

I received a news release from the city regarding new senior housing being built on the corner of Alessandro Boulevard and Lasselle Street. There will be 141 multi-family units, with two of the buildings being constructed specifically for seniors. This will meet the city's affordable housing goal. One of the first buildings will be for senior use and have 10 units. There will be several on-site amenities and energy-efficient appliances. There was no indication when this project will begin or a projection of when it will be completed.

At the HOA meeting the board reviewed and discussed the annual reserve study. We sent it back to the accounting department with a few recommendations for changes. Next month we should have the final report for our records.

As the Landscape Committee continues to beautify our community they have made some changes at the Cactus gate and will be carrying out that theme onto some of the other areas. Keep your eyes open and look for the changes. I like the new look and hope you will too. Remember, we have limitations as to what we can do with water being a concern.

By the time you receive this, Easter will be a thing of the past. I can only say I hope each of you had a special day and celebrated it in your own way.

DELINQUENCY STATUS REPORT:

As of February 29, 2016 there is a total of \$4,878.55 in delinquent assessments. This value represents approximate delinquency rate of 1.36%, as compared to the last delinquency rate of 1.34% for January 31, 2015.

BOARD ACTION:

Committee Updates

- Reports were given by Finance, Social, Architectural, Facility, Landscape, and Communications/Newsletter committees.
- The Board accepted the minutes and financial reports from some of the Committee's recent meetings as presented.

Consent Calendar

• The Board approved as presented:

- The January 31, 2016 Financial Statements.
- The February 24, 2016 Open Session minutes.

The Board removed a lien on a delinquent account.

Unfinished Business

• Landscape Proposals:

Three (3) landscape proposals were reviewed:

- 1. The entry island to the clubhouse parking lot.
- 2. The open area next to the pool gate entrance.

3. The drainage channel entry on Grandview.

Under recommendation from the Landscape Committee, #1 & #2 were deferred for further review and #3 was approved by the board at a cost of \$533.25.

Speeding in the Community:

There was a brief discussion and it was felt that additional research was required and the issue was tabled to be reviewed at the next board meeting.

New Business

Horseshoe Pit & Shuffleboard Survey:

The Board of Directors discussed the response from the residents to the survey regarding installing a horseshoe pit and shuffle board court. Of the 255 homes in the community only 34 households responded. The game of "Cornhole", also known as bean bag toss, was discussed as an alternative to Horse Shoes. Some of the homeowners present stated that there were people in the community who had this game and we might consider it if an area could be set up. Management will get a rough estimate for the cost of a shuffleboard court and it will be reviewed at the next board meeting.

Homeowner Landscape Request – 14727 Grandview:

The homeowner is requesting that her back slope be replanted with more Acacia and the old Acacia removed. Management reached out to Monico Sanchez from Artistic Maintenance, who emailed photos and shared that the Acacia has grown a lot since it was planted last year and it should fill in even more with the growing season approaching. The board will inspect the area on the April Landscape Walk and review its findings at the April 27, 2016 board meeting.

• LED Pool and SPA Lights:

The pool maintenance company, Vivopools, suggested replacing the current light bulbs in the pool and spa with LED light bulbs at a cost of \$239.00 each or \$717.00 total. At the estimated current monthly cost of \$95.00, vs. \$5.00 for LED bulbs, the \$717.00 would be recovered in 8 months. Management contacted our former pool company, 1StopPoolPros, and they stated that they would only replace the lights with new LED light fixtures at a cost of \$2,400. Vivopools cost would be \$2,029.92. The board requested management to supply more details on the bids, itemizing labor and materials separately with product manufacturer and model number. Additionally, management was requested to receive estimates on labor to just replace the bulbs with LED bulbs. The item will be on next month's HOA Board meeting agenda.

• **Draft Reserve Study:** The Board discussed the draft reserve study proposal from Foresight Financial. Minor revisions were made. The draft reserve study will be updated and presented to the Finance Committee in April for review. The final reserve study will be utilized to create the draft budget for fiscal year 2017.

Homeowner Forum

- Phone and Defibrillator in Exercise Room: A homeowner asked the board to research placing a phone and defibrillator in exercise room. This will be added as an agenda item on April board meeting.
- Fire Hazard: A homeowner noted that the dead vegetation in the golf course near our fences is a fire hazard. The homeowners were advised that they should voice their concerns with Moreno Valley Code Enforcement at the Code and Neighborhood Services Division at (951)413-3340.

The Green Thumb Corner Victoria Klaas

Hello fellow gardeners!

April is the month when flowering plants are at the peak of color. Prepare for a surge of growth. Fertilize and prune fast growers. Plants that bloom in April include Geraniums (actually Pelargoniums), Roses, Azaleas, Achillea, Aster, Cosmos, Daisies of all kinds, Daylilies, Baby's Breath, Honeysuckle, Lantana, Lavender, etc.

Consider planting a summer garden with an emphasis on fragrance. Plants like Gardenia, Citrus, Jasmine, Angel Trumpet, Lemon Verbena, Wisteria, Brunfelsia ("Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow"), Roses (not all are scented), Carnations, Lavender and most herbs will be fragrant throughout the warm season, especially in the evening. An evocative and fragrant garden may be designed using only white flowers which lend a romantic, moonlight quality to a night garden. Most white flowers release their best fragrance after sundown. Good candidates include: Gardenia, Flowering Tobacco, Moonflowers, white Angel Trumpet, Cestrum Nocturnum ("Night Blooming Jasmine) and Night Blooming Cereus, a tropical Cactus with a powerful fragrance.

If you are thinking of planting an herb garden, consider Lavender and scented Geraniums to add color and interest. These plants are both fragrant and edible requiring full sun, dry soil and no fertilizer. There are scented Geraniums which smell exactly like attar of roses and those that smell like peppermint, lemon, or chocolate. Also, consider Dianthus which has a spicy clove scented flower and mixes well with herbs.

Do not prune the foliage of spring bulbs even though they are past blooming. These leaves continue to feed the bulbs underground. If removed now they may not bloom again next spring. The longer this foliage is left intact the larger and greater the blooms will be next year. Ideally, leave this foliage alone until it turns yellow and then remove it.

April is your last chance to plant anything before summer heat makes it inadvisable. Anything planted this month has a chance to get its roots established before the demand for water makes it risky to add. This is the ideal time to plant subtropical plants like Bougainvillea or Hibiscus.

If you're new to vegetable gardening, you should know that only plants grown for their fruits (peppers, tomatoes, etc.) should be planted in our area. Vegetables grown for their leaves or roots (e.g. cabbage or carrots) dislike heat and will rush to bloom rather than produce an edible vegetable. Leafy and root vegetables should be planted in the fall.

This time of year local Arboretums have specialty garden sales. Check the internet or visit the Los Angeles County Arboretum, Theodore Payne Foundation in Sun Valley, Torrey Pines State Reserve near Del Mar or Rancho Santa Ana Botanic Garden in Claremont

Ham and Apple Grilled Cheese Sandwich (Makes 2)

- 2 TBS Dijon mustard
- 2 TBS honey
- 4 slices sourdough bread
- 4 ounces thinly sliced deli ham
- 8 thin slices of apple
- 1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese
- 4 ¹/₂ tsp butter, softened

Combine mustard and honey. Spread 2 tablespoons of the mixture over 2 bread slices.

Layer with ham, apple and cheese. Spread remaining mustard mixture on the other remaining 2 slices of bread and place on top.

Butter outsides of each sandwich.

Toast in a small skillet over medium heat for 2-3 minutes on each side or until cheese is melted.

Crab Melts (Serves 2)

(OCIVES 2)

1 can (6 ounces) crabmeat, drained, flaked and cartilage removed.

3 TBS mayonnaise

5 tsp minced celery

- 1 TBS minced green onion
- 2 English muffins, split

4 slices tomato

- 4 slices cheddar cheese (1/2 oz. each)
- 4 slices Monterey Jack cheese (1/2 oz. each)

In a small bowl, combine crab, mayonnaise, celery and onion. Place the muffins on an ungreased baking sheet. Broil 4-6 inches from the heat until toasted. Spread each muffin half with the crab mixture. Top with the tomato and cheese; sprinkle with paprika. Broil until bubbly.

- Moreno Valley Ranch Golf Club: Bridge Investment Group has closed escrow on the purchase of the Golf Course which is great news.
