Homeowners still seem to be confused about how and when to obtain approval for changes to the outside of their houses and landscaping. All improvements, other than changes to plants, bushes and shrubbery, require that a Structure and Landscape Improvement Application and DRC Approval form be submitted to either Prescott (for first time applications) or the Design Review Committee (George Podolsky, Chairman). The rules are in the Mountain View Community Association Design Guidelines. These guidelines are on the mountainviewhoa.org website. Please see the Mountain View Design Review Committee article published in this newsletter for tips on how to comply with the guidelines.

MOUNTAIN VIEW HOMEOWNERS ASSOCIATION
MEETING HIGHLIGHTS—JULY 20, 2005

HOA President, Fred Humphrey, introduced our new Management Representative from Prescott, Carol Foster. Carol has twenty years of experience in the property management field and also represents Prescott at the Oasis in Menifee.

FINANCIAL REPORT – The 2005/2006 Budget was approved. The transfer of Reserve Funds to four Certificates of Deposit was approved.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Facilities – The Ryland name has been removed from the Cactus entrance. Floor mats were purchased for the club entrance. Road Runner has been called to set traps in pool area for rodents. It was suggested that the front clubhouse door be the exclusive entry to facility. The other doors will open from the inside only.

Landscape – The meeting day has been changed to the 4th Wednesday of each month. The Board requested that the committee check flowerpots on the patio fireplace. Due to water seepage, the tiles on the fireplace are becoming discolored. Carol Sweeney will work with Carol Foster to research light collars for palm trees at the Cactus and JFK entrances. Gazenias on slopes are being replaced with water saving plants.

Design and Review – Homeowners must complete an application prior to beginning construction on projects. Replacement of trees and plants does not require DRC approval.

Social Club – One hundred and ten homeowners attended the 4th of July Pot Luck. President, Jo Pavlik, thanked Sharon Cristino and Katie Brambila for their efforts. The Club checking account was changed to a free Washington Mutual account. A mailbox has been acquired for the Social Club, using the clubhouse address. The speaker for the general meeting on August 3rd will be Carol Foster, our new management representative from Prescott. On August 19th, there will be a poolside TGIF with half of the 50/50 funds designated for Project Linus. A game night has been scheduled for September 30th. A request was made for additional electrical outlets in the pool, patio and entrance areas.

Web Page – The web page has been updated to include Carol Foster as new management representative from Prescott. A list of contractors will be updated for inclusion in the web page.

HOMEOWNER INPUT/OPEN FORUM – Board approved request to include a HOA Financial Statement in the newsletter each month. On October 16th, George Sweeney has reserved 20 seats at the Lawrence Welk Theatre for the musical "Gypsy." Carol Foster was asked to review the CC&R's regarding view lots. Also, Carol Foster has been in touch with the City of Moreno Valley and Ryland in an effort to have the HOA approve the Mountain View planned development in order for the Board to sign off. The streets will be sealed when this has been accomplished.

MOUNTAIN VIEW DESIGN REVIEW COMMITTEE

Each month the Design Review Committee (DRC) will provide a few excerpts from our governing documents. The excerpt selection may come from concerns by what has been observed in the neighborhood or from a question of a homeowner. Subsequent inputs will come from members of the committee.

The DRC is responsible for evaluating the individual merits of an application submitted by a homeowner. They will ensure that the proposed improvements are compatible with the architectural characteristics of the applicant's house, adjoining houses, and the neighborhood setting. Compatibility is defined as similarity in architectural style, quality of workmanship, similar use of materials, color, and construction detail.

This past month, the Design Review Committee received the following inquiries regarding the Mountain View Community Association Structure and Landscape Improvement Application:

- 1. I have completed all previous improvements, had them approved and received my refund from Prescott. I want to redo the landscaping in my BACKYARD and want to start right now. Must I submit the Structure and Landscape Improvement Application?**

All improvements, other than changes to plants, bushes and shrubbery, require that a Structure and Landscape Improvement Application be submitted along with a DRC Approval form.

- 2. My improvement requires approval from the DRC, and my contractor is here and ready to start. What needs to be done?**

*Contact one of the DRC team members. If a team member is available, he/she will come out and determine if the proposed improvements meet all the guidelines. If all the guidelines are met, the team member can issue a verbal approval so that the contract can begin. If the proposed improvement does not meet all the requirements of the CC&R's, or if a DRC team member is not available, **DO NOT ALLOW YOUR CONTRACTOR TO START WORKING UNTIL YOU RECEIVE PROPER APPROVAL.***

- 3. What will happen if I cannot contact one of the DRC team members or do not submit a Structure and Landscape Improvement Application and allow my contractor to begin work?**

You will receive a fine.

- 4. I have followed all of the required steps and have received approval. The contractor has begun construction and, due to hidden problems, needs to make changes. What should I do?**

*Complete a new Structure and Landscape Improvement Application, along with a DRC Approval Form, Mark them as an addendum and contact one of the DRC team members for approval. **DO NOT ALLOW YOUR CONTRACTOR TO CONTINUE WORKING UNTIL YOU RECEIVE PROPER APPROVAL.***

- 5. What will happen if I cannot contact one of the DRC team members or do not submit an amended Structure and Landscape Improvement Application along with a DCR Approval Form and allow my contractor to continue to work?**

You will receive a fine.

- 6. What will be the amount of the fine?**

The amount of the fine will be determined by the type of infraction and will be set by the HOA Board.



THE GARDENER'S CORNER

From the gardener's corner... Summer has come in with a bang! 100 degrees or more means we must work in the garden very early in the morning or nothing will get done!

Trees – Remove tree suckers and water sprouts – the long shoots that grow straight up from the trunk base. Keep tree trunks, especially of young trees, painted with white indoor latex paint to protect them from sunscald. Water all trees deeply. Pick up and destroy fallen fruit. Prune diseased or dead limbs but leave heavy pruning until winter. Clean up around the base of each tree and add mulch. This will prevent diseases from spreading. Stop feeding your trees later this month.

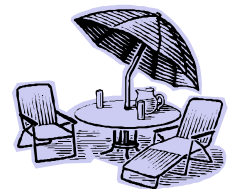
Blessed with **too many tomatoes?** Freeze them for winter use. Wash and cut out the core, cut them into quarters and place them on a cookie sheet so they don't touch. When they are frozen transfer them to containers for use later. The peel will slip off when the tomato pieces begin to thaw.

Remove faded blooms of perennials like coreopsis, Shasta daisies, delphiniums, penstemons and yarrow. Cut them back to within six inches of the soil and they may bloom again in fall. Simple household baking soda will **get rid of mildew in your garden**. Dissolve about one quarter ounce in a gallon of water. Spray onto plant leaves weekly. The baking soda serves both as a preventative and a cure – mildew spores cannot spread or reproduce, so their development is stopped. Paint tool handles and a foot or so of hose nozzle ends with a bright color of exterior enamel paint so you can find them easily when they're hiding in green foliage

Garden Club News... We are having a **garden club meeting and plant exchange** at our regular meeting on Friday, August 12th. Audrey Wilson and I will be there to help answer plant and tree questions. This is a good month to divide those overgrown daylilies, agapanthus and irises, lilies and oriental poppies (and for those of you lucky enough to grow them here, peonies). My easy method for dividing a plant is to dig up the whole plant, lay it out on newspaper, divide said plant into 2 or 4 pieces (depending on the size). Replace one piece of the plant in the original hole and add compost to fill. Find another place in the garden

by Kyung & K.C. Son

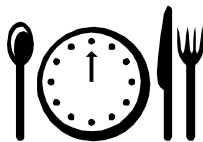
1 head	cabbage, thinly sliced

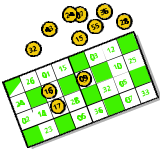
