BOARD ACTION:

Committee Updates

Reports were given by the Finance, Architectural, Social, Facility, Communications/Newsletter, Landscape, and Neighborhood Watch committees.

The Finance Committee reported that Frank Pavlik is stepping down as committee Chair.

The Social Club reported that reservations for the Christmas party at Soboba are going fast.

The Architecture Committee reported difficulty in getting Notices of Completion returned. There will be three front yard projects in December.

The Landscape Committee reported that fixing the landscape and two irrigation controllers in the accident area on Grandview is underway.

At this meeting, the Board approved a proposal by Artistic Maintenance to install a root barrier along the fence/slope behind her house at a cost of \$245.00 to be funded by Operating Funds.

New Business

Spa Controller Replacement: The Board reviewed and approved a proposal to replace the non-functioning chemical controller for the spa, at a cost of \$1,469.00. This is to be funded by the Reserves.

Pool Re-plastering is planned for this winter. The Board reviewed the proposals submitted and requested more information. A short meeting will be held in December to discuss the findings.

HOMEOWNER FORUM

Board Applications: A homeowner requested the deadline for submitting applications to run for the Board. The deadline is Dec. 5th.

Accident on Grandview: Payment for damages to the community will be pursued through our insurance company and that of the homeowner involved.

Two Board Members will be elected. Polls will open and close between 6:00pm and 6:05pm.


A message from Moreno Valley Council Member George Price:

The Green Thumb Corner Victoria Klaas

Greetings Fellow Gardeners:

Typically, December is the coldest month of the year. In years past, however, we have experienced wide swings in temperature when it hasn't been cold at all.

If you haven't planted colorful, winter annuals, it's not too late. Violas, Pansies, Snapdragons, Iceland Poppies, Nemesia, and many others will bloom continuously through the cold days of winter. Because of the cool weather, they require little water. The only water required is during Santa Ana winds or if rain simply fails to appear.

Camellias are also short-day bloomers and this is a good time to plant them. Did you know that there are even varieties of Camellia that make great ground covers? Camellia sasanqua such as "White Dives", "Chansonette", and "Marge Miller" bloom in winter. Camellias perfect for a hedge include "Bob Hope," "Carter's Sunburst," and "Taylor's Perfection." These also bloom in winter.

Turf grasses benefit from a light feeding of a granular fertilizer this month and again in January and February. Cold nights mean that soil bacteria that produces nitrogen during warmer weather is now dormant and thus, nitrogen is unavailable to roots. Artificial fertilizers will quickly green up brown or yellow lawns.

Time to relocate roses or small deciduous fruit trees. Before digging them up, prune them down to a manageable size. Roots too, should be pruned to accommodate the size of a new planting hole. Plant them at the same level they were previously and put water in the well to settle the soil. Cold soil temperatures promote strong root growth. Transplants should resume normal, vigorous growth in March.

Cymbidium orchids often begin blooming in December. These hardy plants do well outdoors all year long under covered patios. They require some winter chill to bloom and their flowers are spectacular, producing twenty or more blooms.

Don't forget to protect tropical and sub-tropical

plants from frost. Cover them, move them under a patio or indoors if frost threatens. Don't prune these plants during cold weather. This will only stimulate new growth making them even more vulnerable to frost and dieback.

Resist the impulse to prune off frost damage. The damaged portion protects the plant from further frost injury. Just be patient until mid-April.

Rattle Those Pots and Pans from the kitchen of Katie Wenke

Grandma Wenke's Christmas Ice Box Cookies

1 pound butter

1 cup granulated sugar

3 TBS lemon juice

1 ½ ounces liquor (i.e., whisky, bourbon, etc.)

2 cooked egg yolks

2 raw egg yolks, beaten

5 cups flour

Finely ground nuts

Cream together butter and sugar.

Add lemon juice and liquor.

Fold in mashed cooked egg yolks and flour. Mix batter by hand.

Make into one or two balls and refrigerate overnight.

Flour the counter or large cutting board. Roll dough out and cut with a round cookie cutter.

Place cookies on an ungreased cookie sheet.

Brush each cookie with beaten raw egg yolks and sprinkle with nuts.

Bake at 375 degrees for 10-15 minutes.

Check frequently close to the 10 minutes and after the 10 minutes as they brown quickly.

Cool on wire rack

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
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
