FINANCIAL SUMMARY:

Data was not available due to early meeting.

DELINQUENCY STATUS REPORT:

As of October 31, 2019, there is a total of \$4,022 in delinquent assessments. This value represents an approximate delinquency rate of 1.12%, as compared to the last delinquency rate of 2.36 % on September 30, 2019.

COMMITTEE UPDATES:

Finance: Our CD's were discussed and that we should keep \$75K available in cash.

Social: Our Christmas Luncheon is December 7 at Woody's BBQ. No TGIF in December.

Architecture: Still awaiting paint chips for new house colors. Receiving many calls in response to community drive-through letters.

Facilities: New BBQs were installed. Electrical problems at gates were fixed, accommodating our beautiful holiday gate lights. Other common area lights are also being repaired.

Landscape: No new projects at this time. Some over-watering is being addressed.

Communications: A proposal was submitted for new software for our computer at \$70 per year at this time. A proposal for data storage will be submitted at a later date.

Clubhouse Renovation: A cabinet for the men's room and a broom closet were purchased and assembled. We will be selecting wall art soon.

Board approved software purchase for computer and purchase of acoustic panels. Board accepted committee reports as presented.

Rattle Those Pots and Pans From The Kitchen of Katie Wenke

RUM CAKE

- 1 Pkg. Duncan Hines Golden Butter Cake Mix
- 1 Small Pkg Instant Vanilla Pudding
- ¹/₂ Cup Rum (White)
- 1/2 Cup Water
- 1/2 Cup Salad Oil
- 4 Eggs

Combine and beat 3 minutes with mixer

Prepare "Bundt Pan" (With Oil and Flour) Pour batter into Bundt Pan Bake at 325 Degrees for 50 to 60 Minutes

10 Minutes before cake is done, make glaze.

- 1/2 Cup Melted Butter
- $\frac{1}{2}$ Cup white sugar
- 1/4 Cup Rum (White)
- 1/4 Cup Water
- Mix Well

Remove Cake from oven and immediately pour the glaze over the cake (while the cake is hot and still in Bundt pan).

Cool For 30 Minutes and Remove from Bundt Pan.

BLUEBERRY COFFEE CAKE

- 1 Pkg. Duncan Hines Blueberry Muffin Mix
- 2 Tablespoons cooking oil
- 1 Egg
- 1/2 Cup Water
- 1/3 Cup Brown Sugar
- 1 Teaspoon Cinnamon

Preheat oven to 350 Degrees.

Empty blueberries into strainer. Wash under cold running water. (Set aside to drain).

Pour oil into one 8-inch or 9-inch square or round pan; tilt pan to cover bottom.

Place muffin mix, egg and water into pan. Stir with a fork until blended (about 1 minute). Sprinkle drained blueberries, brown sugar and cinnamon over batter.

Use a fork to fold into batter just enough to create a marbled effect. Spread batter evenly in pan.

Bake at 350 Degrees for 25 to 30 minutes until coffee cake tests done with a toothpick.

Use a knife to loosen cake from sides. Cut and serve directly from pan.

## The Green Thumb Corner

#### Greetings Fellow Gardeners,

December is often an odd mix of bitter morning cold or unprecedented afternoon warmth. Lots of plants will bloom in December and early January.

If you planted annuals like Violas or Iceland Poppies in October, they are probably blooming right now.

Plants that will bloom in December are Camellia which is nearly immune to the damage of blossom blight. These come in traditional Camellia colors, but red is particularly lovely for the Christmas season.

Turf grasses will benefit from a light feeding of granular fertilizer this month. Feed them again in January and February.

Cold nights mean that summer producing nitrogen soil bacteria are now dormant and unavailable to roots. Artificial fertilizers will quickly green up brown or yellow lawns.

You should plant your perennials this month. Delphiniums, Foxglove, Columbine, and Coral Bells will bloom in late winter.

Crowded Perennials such as Daylilies or Agapanthus may be divided during the winter months. This is also an ideal time to relocate roses or small deciduous fruit trees. Prune them down to a manageable size first before digging them up. Roots should be pruned to accommodate the size of a new planting hole. Plant at the same level they were previously growing and water well to settle the soil.

Cold soil temperatures promote strong root growth. Cymbidium Orchids often begin blooming in December. These hardy orchids do very well outdoors under covered patios as they require some winter chill to bloom. Their flowers are spectacular as long, showy shapes of twenty or more blooms.

You can also plant spring flowering bulbs like Narcissus, Tulips, and Hyacinths. Garden herbs and vegetables may also be planted in December. Grow your carrots and radishes from seed but buy transplants of your leafy vegetables such as cabbage, kale, and other greens. Weeding may become necessary during December if winter rains have caused germination of grasses and weeds.

This is also the month for snails and cutworms. Baits are available for both. Personally, I have found the live Decollate snail to be very effective. These small, conical snails look harmless but at night, they hunt in small "packs" to surround and devour the pesky European Brown Garden Snail. Don't expect to see them much as they burrow into soil by day and emerge after dark or on wet days. The more you release, the faster the infestation is controlled.

Don't forget to protect tropical and subtropical plants from frost. If frost threatens, cover them or move them under a patio or indoors. Don't prune these plants during cold weather as it will only stimulate new growth and make them more vulnerable.

If plants are damaged by frost, resist the impulse to prune off the damage. The damaged portion will protect them from further cold injury. Be patient. Delay pruning tender plants until mid-April.
