Dear Mountain View Residents,

Several significant issues were brought up at the Board meeting, so here goes.

ANNUAL ELECTION OF BOARD MEMBERS FOR THE HOA. The ballots were not mailed on time for an election in January. This was caused by a problem between the Management Company and the vendor they use for mailing. When the ballots were mailed, they had incorrect instructions on cumulative voting. Finally, all has been corrected. Just remember to use the green ballot. **Please vote**. This is how your voice is heard and how you can change things. SHUT DOWN OF POOL AND SPA. The pool and spa will be closed beginning the week of February 16, weather permitting. We are draining the pool and spa, acid washing both, and doing minor repairs. Signs will be posted to stay out of the pool area. Please do not enter the area as there will be construction hazards and an empty pool. The spa will open again shortly thereafter. The pool will be heated beginning April 1.

A REMINDER TO BE SAFE ON OUR STREETS. A homeowner wrote the Board regarding the "Drive 25 and Keep Your Neighbor Alive" slogan. He wanted to remind us that pedestrians and bicyclists have a responsibility for their own safety. He noted that there have been several occasions in the poor lighting of early morning or dusk, while "driving 25," that he has been startled by someone bicycling, strolling, or walking their dogs down the middle of Grandview Drive. They give the impression that they have a right to do this and it is reckless. He doubted that they would do this on JFK or Cactus and get away with it more than once. His point is that whether we are bicyclists, pedestrians or drivers we all need to obey the law, be safe, and be courteous to one another

JFK GATE PROBLEM. We've had an issue with the inbound JFK gate not opening. Remotes, the gate code, even the post office key would not work. It created a hazard on JFK because cars turning left were blocking people trying to back out and turn around. Cars were lined up on JFK waiting to turn into the gate. We finally managed to get one side of the gate open and the gate company responded within a couple hours. Hopefully it will not happen again.



### Gardening By Victoria Klaas

Although we've enjoyed (or rather, endured, depending on one's point of view) some very cold weather this month, January should still be a busy time in the garden. For those of us who love this activity, gardening offers a great excuse to enjoy the fresh air and a little exercise.

January is the ideal month in which to plant all types of bare root plants, including deciduous fruit trees and roses. These plants will be available at all local nurseries and garden centers this month and can cost a small fraction of what they will cost if potted later in the spring. Regardless of the smaller root ball size on these plants please resist the temptation to economize on the size of the planting hole you dig.



Our soil in the community is less than ideal (not to put too fine a point on it). Incorporating good compost into the planting mix is important as it helps growing roots to expand. Good compost should not be full of dry wood. Bacteria, which decomposes wood, will rob the soil of nitrogen. It should be dark in color, crumbly in the hand and not splintery. It is worth paying a little extra at a nursery to obtain a well composted product. This time of year a plant's growth is in its roots. The larger and more vigorous the root ball, the larger and faster the tree or shrub will grow when suitable weather arrives.

January is also the month to prune deciduous fruit trees, such as apple, and rose bushes. When pruning, consider the shape and height of the bush or tree and don't be afraid to cut back hard. Roses are vigorous growers and will reward your efforts with strong, new growth later in the season. Look for dormant leaf buds which branch outwards not into the center of the bush. Make judicious cuts just above these. Unpruned roses will produce fewer and smaller blooms than will a well groomed plant. Clean out and remove any leaves the plants are still bearing, as these are a possible source of disease to new growth. Also, remember to rake and dispose of dead flowers and leaves beneath your plants. Dormant oil sprays may now be safely used on deciduous fruit trees and roses to protect them against diseases and insects. You can safely and inexpensively make your own at home using 2 tablespoons of canola oil and 1 tablespoon of baking soda mixed with a gallon of water. This will effectively smother and kill the over wintering eggs of such pests as aphids, scale and mites.

It is not too late to plant annuals for winter color. Garden centers have a lovely selection of cool weather annual plants that can add instant color. Violas, including pansies come in a rainbow of colors and combinations of colors which should suit anyone's fancy. Iceland poppies (Papaver nudicaule) provide color until warm weather and provide tall, gracefully nodding blooms in a rich tapestry of colors. Also consider Snapdragons (Antirrhinum majus), Lobelia for its many lovely shades of blue, or white candytuft (Iberis), which is a perennial, for crisp white blooms.

Please refrain from cutting back any cold weather frost damaged growth on tender tropical and subtropical plants (such as Bougainvillea, Hibiscus, etc.) This "thatch" will protect these plants from further damage during subsequent frosts and is best left alone until approximately April 1<sup>st</sup> when the danger of frost is past. Also, do not put out any new tropical or subtropical species until April. These plants need to slowly acclimate to cold weather over a period of weeks and will often die of shock if planted in the open during winter. Although this month may feel cold and wintry it is truly the first month of spring from your garden's point of view.

Flowering pear, almonds and a few others bloom in January. This is quite normal.

Birds are already mating and searching for nesting sites. Provide nesting boxes with small cavities (1 inch is ideal) to encourage Wrens and Bluebirds. The small opening will discourage the house sparrow which is not a native bird. It tends to out-compete indigenous birds for food and nesting sites. Ideally, birds prefer shaded homes or north or east facing entries. Also, consider providing cut human hair for hummingbird nests as they often have hatchlings in late January.
