DELINQUENCY STATUS REPORT:

As of December 31, 2015 there is a total of \$5,229.81 in delinquent assessments. This value represents an approximate delinquency rate of 1.42%, as compared to the last delinquency rate of 1.42% for October 31, 2015.

BOARD ACTION:

Committee Updates:

 Reports were given by Finance, Social, Architectural, Facility, Landscape and Communications/Newsletter committees.

The Finance Committee stated that there is \$153,000, currently at 0.65%, which will be reinvested at a 1.25% percentage rate, in a Medallion Bank Salt Lake City CD, which will mature on 8/9/2018 and fits into the ladder of investments that we currently have.

 The Board of Directors accepted the minutes and financial reports from some of the Committee's recent meetings and reports as presented.

- Board approved October & November, 2015 Financial Statements.
- The Board reviewed FirstService Residential's Management Statement of Disclosures and agreed to file the disclosure statements as mandated by Civil Code.

Unfinished Business:

Stucco Wall Damage Claim
 At the last meeting, the Board of Directors approved to file a lawsuit in hopes that the City would agree to repair the damage to the Association stucco wall. Kerry Trost, Claims Manager from PERMA, granted the Association a 90-day extension to file legal action against the City. Mr. Trost requested to see two (2) proposals submitted by the Association to repair the wall.

The Board of Directors reviewed the proposals received and unanimously agreed to submit the highest two (2) to Kerry Trost.

New Business:

Pool Heat During Winter
 The Board of Directors discussed the pool heater, which is turned off during winter. The question was when it will be turned back on. After discussion, it was unanimously agreed that it will be turned on April 1st.

Community Survey
 The Board of Directors expressed interest in obtaining resident's opinions in regards to installing a horseshoe pit and shuffleboard court.
 A draft survey created by Management was reviewed and the Board of Directors decided that the survey will be distributed to the membership in the March newsletter.




Grace Kim demonstrated an alternative way to create

Come share them with us. We'd love to see them.




Our February meeting will be dedicated to one of the newest hobby crazes – adult coloring. Adult coloring

Green Thumb Corner Victoria Klaas

Hello fellow gardeners!

February is a month of waiting. Gardeners need patience before pruning back frost damaged foliage. We must wait to replace or introduce new tropical plants and to feed most plants.

In February, citrus plants develop pests that cause blemishes, curling leaves or cottony, white growths. They may be attacked by the Argentine Army Ant, a small, dark colored ant that swarms by the billions in yards and homes. Although it does not carry disease, it is a tiny farmer with flocks that consist of Aphids and Scale insects. Argentine Ants fiercely protect these pests from harm carrying them from plant to plant. They actually "milk" the tiny pests which produce a rich, sugary, ambrosia-like secretion. Army Ants must be controlled before other insects can be addressed.

A simple bait formula: ½ tsp. boric acid, 3 tbs. sugar, and I cup of water. Mix thoroughly and pour into a small clean glass jar with a lid. Use a nail to create a hole in the lid through which ants can enter. The jar is best placed on the ground on its side slightly nested into the soil for stability. **This mixture is dangerous to pets and children. Use with caution**. The ants carry it to their underground chambers and share it with the colony. Baits can also be purchased at garden stores. Note: **use granule bait only if you have no pets**. Follow package directions carefully.

If citrus branches touch the ground, prune them higher so ants are less apt to ascend the trees. To prevent ants from climbing trunks, wrap the lower trunk with quilt batting (from a fabric store), cover snugly with plastic wrap and apply a sticky ant repellant product such as Tree Tanglefoot Pest Barrier. This should last all season as long as the branches do not touch the ground.

Dust is a major reason pests are able to hide in citrus or other evergreen plants. Even indoor plants like *Ficus* should be washed well. Dusty plants are a haven for red spider mites, wooly whiteflies, and mealybugs. If your plants are already infested with pests, spray with a soapy mixture of 1 or 2 Tbs. of liquid dishwashing detergent per gallon of water. A Tbsp. of vegetable oil added to the mix will smother unhatched eggs. Spray all leaf sides thoroughly. Repeat as necessary. Avoid using strong insecticides like Malathion when plants are in bloom. Although this kills pests it also kills Honeybees which are necessary for food production.

Honeybees are considered threatened and are rapidly declining in numbers. We must do what we can to protect them in our gardens.

Keep trees, roses and ornamentals clean and they will be protected by natural, beneficial predators. This should help prevent the use of stronger insecticides.

This is a good time to plant or transplant Camellias. Booms are fragrant and will grow in full sun with adequate moisture. Other good landscape plants are Clivia (large orange or red bell shaped flowers), deciduous and "Saucer" Magnolias and Gerberas which are large African Daisies available in an array of colors.

When it comes to roses, it's a fact that they are nearly impossible to grow without a lot of spraying for disease and pests. There are many varieties that require less attention if kept well-watered and fertilized. Check them out at the local store gardens. If rain is inadequate, roses should receive at least an inch of water each week from mid-February on. They should also be fertilized as soon as the new foliage loses its rosy color and turns green. Use a complete rose formula and repeat the feeding each month until September or October.

Rattle Those Pots and Pans

Baked Round Steak in Barbeque Sauce

2 ½ pounds round steak, cut into strips

1 Tbs vegetable oil

1/4 cup chopped onion

½ clove minced garlic

1/4 cup + 2 Tbs white vinegar

1 ½ tsp white sugar

1/4 cup catsup

½ tsp dry mustard

½ tsp paprika

½ tsp salt

1/8 tsp pepper

Heat oil in a large skillet over medium high heat. Brown steak on all sides.

With a slotted spoon, transfer meat to a baking dish Stir in garlic and onion. Cook about 5 minutes. Add vinegar, sugar and catsup.

Stir in mustard, paprika, salt and pepper.

Simmer about 3 minutes. Pour over meat.

Cover baking dish. Cook at 325 for 1 hour.

Uncover and bake another 30 minutes.
