The Board had a special session on December 17, 2015 to discuss changes to the ARC guidelines. Vinyl fencing has been approved. The new rules will be distributed in the near future. There is only one color of vinyl fencing approved. It is Sandstone. Along with this change, the colors of paint for the wooden fences have changed to a sandstone-like color. The idea behind the "one color" is to make it easier for neighbors to agree on one color for common fences and to make the community look nice from the street.

The Board also had a budget session for the next budget year (August 2016 to July 2017). Each year the Board meets to begin planning for the next budget year. The Board considers those projects that must be done and those projects that would improve the community. A financial representative from FirstService Residential was in attendance to advise the board. The next step in the process will be for FirstService to prepare a budget based on this year's financials to date, updated for all known changes, and the Board input from this meeting. This draft budget is sent to the Finance Committee for approval, then on to the Board for approval in May.

Thanks to the Social Club and all the Committees for the great job you did on the parties, decorations and the various activities throughout the year. It certainly makes Mountain View a great place to live.

ARC Rule Change Approval

DELINQUENCY STATUS REPORT:

As of November 30, 2015 there is a total of \$5,859.19 in delinquent assessments. This value represents an approximate delinquency rate of 1.64%, as compared to the last delinquency rate of 1.42% for October 31, 2015.

HOMEOWNER FORUM:

 A homeowner stated that she has a "View Lot", but she can see her neighbors fence which has a nonstandard color setting (bright chartreuse green).
 She stated that for slope people, pet fences should be out of view of their neighbors. The board will take this matter under advisement for further discussion.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

STUCCO WALL DAMAGE CLAIM
 At the last meeting, the Board of Directors reviewed the cost to repair the damage to the stucco wall along Cactus that was caused from the City's sprinklers. Fred Humphrey reached out to City Councilman, George E. Price regarding the City's denial of the Association's claim. As of December 11, 2015, a response has not been received.

The Board of Directors discussed information received from George E. Price and our lawyers, Peters & Freedman and the decision was made to file a law suit with the City.

RULE CHANGE:

The Board of Directors reviewed correspondence which was received from homeowners regarding the proposed rule changes to enforcement, xeriscape, fencing as well as awnings and roll up shades. After discussion, the Board of Directors approved the rule changes as written.

The approved rule changes will be mailed out to homeowners. These approved rules will replace the previous rules for the sections in the Architectural Guidelines which were last updated on August 27, 2014.

Also, the rule changes will be available online at the web site, www.mountainviewhoa.org in the section "Architectural Review Committee" as "RESTATED ARCHITECTURAL GUIDELINES ADOPTED August 20, 2008, May 23, 2012 & Updated August 27, 2014 & December 17, 2015".

The revised rules are to be followed from this point forward. For example, if your fence is painted an approved color that is no longer approved per the new rule change, you do not have to repaint/stain your fence right away. You may wait until the fence is in need of repainting/staining or replacement.

Green Thumb Corner Victoria Klaas

Hello fellow gardeners!

December continued to be colder and drier than predicted. However, I still retain some hope we will get more rain this month.

January is Southern California's first month of Spring. One can expect to see Quince, blooming Almond, Flowering Pear, early Daffodils and Crocus flowers. From a plant's point of view, we have no real winter here. Temperatures which seem really cold to us are perfectly comfortable for the vast majority of our plants. They will bloom throughout the winter if given even the smallest encouragement.

Bare-root roses are appearing in garden centers, even though the roses in our gardens are still in flower. For the best health of your roses, encourage them to go dormant for a few weeks. The rest is important to their longevity, resulting in more perfect and larger flowers.

Cut back roses hard this month. When pruning, consider the proper shaping of plants. Eliminate all weak or dead growth and crossing branches. Strip off and dispose of all remaining leaves. Leaves left on the plant may result in disease and insects. Examine plant canes and you may see tiny green swellings of dormant leaf buds. Make cuts just above one of these buds and always choose an outward facing bud. This will encourage roses to develop a pleasing shape. After replanting, they will begin producing new growth. Remember, Hybrid Tea roses bloom only on new wood and without regular pruning they will not continue to produce.

Besides roses, garden centers are also offering bareroot fruit trees. Dwarf selections are ideal for small yards. They bear fruit, are easier to harvest, and are a good size for small gardens. Flowering peaches have lovely flowers and are closely related to double roses.

We've had a lot of frost this fall. However, it has not been cold enough to really damage plants. In fact, extended cold can actually "harden" tender plants such as Lantana making them more resistant to cold nights. Beware though, a brief warm spell can fool them into producing new growth. This can still damage them. Keep an eye on your gardens

Different cultivars of the same plant species may vary by frost tolerance. Bougainvillea "Barbara Karst" is much hardier (by five or six degrees) than Bougainvillea "Rosenka." Plant breeders strive to produce hardier plants. The exact degree of frost a plant may tolerate varies from species to species. If you haven't been successful getting winter color planted before Christmas, it's still not too late. Primroses have stunning color and love cold weather. This also applies to Violas, Iceland Poppies, Calendula, Sweet Alyssum, Calibrachoa, and most other winter flowering annuals and perennials.

Continue to bait for snails if necessary. Watch for gophers which are more active in winter and spring. Garden centers offer traps, baits and gas bombs to deal with them. They can be very difficult to eliminate.

New garden catalogs are published this month. It's also a good time to start fun seeds such as mixed cacti. They are easy to grow and there's often a surprise in each packet.

Rattle Those Pots and Pans

Cantaloupe Chicken Salad

(Serves 2)

1/4 cup fat-free mayonnaise 2 TBS fat-free sour cream 11/2 tsp sugar

½ tsp grated lemon peel

1/4 tsp ground ginger

Dash salt and pepper

1 cup cubed cooked chicken breast

½ cup sliced celery

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup seedless red grapes, halved

2 green onions, chopped

1 small cantaloupe, halved and seeded

1/4 cup silvered almonds, toasted

In a large bowl, combine the mayonnaise, sour cream, sugar, lemon peel, lemon juice, ginger, salt and pepper.

Add the chicken, celery, grapes and onions; toss to coat.

Spoon 1 cup salad mixture into each cantaloupe half.

Sprinkle with almonds.



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
