Neighborhood Watch

By far, the most common threat to our community is

home burglary. According to the FBI, a burglary occurs somewhere in the United States every 15.4 seconds. By definition, the crime of burglary is a nonconfrontational property crime that occurs when we are not at home. However, becoming a burglary victim can leave a family feeling vulnerable and violated. The following tips from the Moreno Valley Police Department can help prevent you from becoming a victim.

Doors and Locks

- Use a solid core or metal door for all entrance points.
- Use a quality, heavy-duty deadbolt lock with a one-inch throw bolt.
- Use a quality, heavy-duty, knob-inlock set with a dead-latch mechanism.
- Use a heavy-duty, four-screw, strike plate with 3-inch screws to penetrate into a wooden door frame.
- Use a wide-angle 160 degree peephole mounted no higher than 58 inches.

Sliding-Glass Patio Doors

- Use a secondary blocking device on all sliding glass doors.
- Keep the latch mechanism and sliding glass rollers in good condition and properly adjusted.
- Use anti-lift devices such as throughthe-door pins or upper track screws.
- Use highly visible alarm decals or beware of dog decals.

Windows

- Secure all accessible windows with secondary blocking devices.
- Block accessible windows open for ventilation no more than 6 inches.
- Make sure someone cannot reach through a window and unlock a door.
- Use anti-lift devices to prevent windows from being lifted out.
- USE AN ALARM!

Alarm Systems

- Install, program and maintain your alarm system.
- Alarm system needs to be LOUD.
- Make sure your alarm response call list is up to date.
- Instruct your neighbor how to respond to an alarm at your home.
- Be a Good Neighbor
- Know all your adjacent neighbors.
- Agree to watch out for each other's homes.
- While on vacation be sure newspapers and mail are picked up.
- Become an active participant in the Neighborhood Watch!

The Green Thumb Corner Victoria Klaas

Greetings Fellow Gardeners:

January is the ideal month to plant all types of bare root plants, including deciduous fruit trees and roses. These plants are available at local nurseries and garden centers now. Their root balls are small but, resist the temptation to economize on the size of the planting hole. You will need to incorporate good compost into the planting mix so roots can expand. Compost should not be full of dry wood. Decomposing wood is bacteria and will rob the soil of nitrogen. It is worth paying a little extra to obtain a well composted product. Plant growth this time of year is in the roots. The larger and more vigorous the root ball, the larger and faster the tree or shrub will grow in suitable weather.

Prune deciduous fruit trees such as apple and rose bushes. Consider the shape and height of the bush or tree and don't be afraid to cut back hard. Roses are vigorous growers and will have strong new growth later in the season. Look for dormant leaf buds branching <u>outward</u> and cut just above them. A well-groomed plant will produce large, healthy blooms. Rake and dispose of dead flowers and leaves beneath your plants.

Use dormant oil on deciduous fruit trees and roses to protect them from diseases and insects. You can make your own by using 2 tablespoons of canola oil and 1 tablespoon of baking soda mixed with a gallon of water. This will effectively smother and kill the overwintering eggs of pests like aphids, scale and mites.

Plant annuals for winter color. Violas, Pansies and Iceland Poppies provide color until warm weather. Also, consider Snapdragons, Lobelia and White Candytuft.

Refrain from cutting back any frost damaged growth on tropical and subtropical plants (Bougainvillea, Hibiscus, etc.) This "thatch" protects plants from further damage in subsequent frosts. It is best left alone until approximately April 1st. Also, do not plant new tropical or subtropical species until April. They need to acclimate to cold weather over a period of weeks and could die of shock if planted during winter.

January is really the first month of spring - from a garden's viewpoint. Flowering pear and almonds bloom in January and birds are already mating and searching for nesting sites. You can provide nesting boxes with small cavities (1 inch is ideal) to afford Wrens and Bluebirds a place to hatch young. The small openings will discourage the House Sparrow which will out-compete indigenous birds for food and nesting sites. Ideally, birds prefer shaded homes or north or east facing entries. Also consider providing cut human hair for hummingbirds. They will often have hatchlings in late January.

Chicken Lettuce Wraps

3 chicken tenders or 1 chicken breast, seasoned, cooked and diced

½ pint grape tomatoes, diced

½ avocado, diced

4 slices of bacon, cooked and diced

4 leafs of Iceberg or Romaine lettuce

2 TBS Dijon mustard

2 TBS sour cream

1/4 tsp fresh ground pepper or to taste

Prepare Dijon sauce:

In a small bowl, wisk together mustard, sour cream and pepper.

Set aside for topping in the lettuce wraps.

Prepare lettuce wraps:

Put 2 leaves together, one on top of the other. Repeat with other leaves.

Divide the chicken among the lettuce leaves. Top each with the avocado, tomatoes, bacon and Dijon dressing.

Pick up wrap as you would a taco. Eat and enjoy!
