The caller threatened to turn off her electricity for non-payment.

The resident called Southern California Edison at 800-655-4555.

They were informed that this is their non-payment procedure:

First: A notice of payment overdue is sent in the mail

<u>Next</u>: A notice of non-payment is mailed, and a phone call may be made. They will try to work with you if you need more time.

Next: A shutoff notice is sent by mail and a phone call may be made as a last resort, if you will not work with them.

Southern California Edison will never make a shutoff phone call as their first contact and will never demand your credit or debit card number or other form of automatic payment.

If you receive this kind of call, please call Edison at 800-655-4555 to verify your payment status and to help apprehend these scammers.

Chicken Lettuce Wraps

Ingredients

3 chicken tenders or 1 chicken breast (Seasoned, cooked and diced)

½ pint grape tomatoes, diced

½ avocado, diced

4 slices of bacon, cooked and diced

4 leaf's of Iceberg or Romaine lettuce

2 TBS Dijon mustard

2 TBS sour cream

1/4 tsp fresh ground pepper or to taste

Prepare Dijon sauce:

In a small bowl, Wisk together:

Mustard,

Sour cream and

Pepper.

Set aside for topping in the lettuce wraps.

Prepare lettuce wraps:

Put 2 leaves together, one on top of the other. Repeat with other leaves.

Divide the chicken among the lettuce leaves. Top each with the avocado, tomatoes, bacon and Dijon dressing.

Pick up wrap as you would a taco.

STUFFED MANICOTTI

1 lb. Hamburger

1 lb. Sausage

2/3 Cup chopped onion

2 Cups mozzarella cheese

1 Cup cottage cheese

1/4 Tsp. garlic salt

1 (14 ct.) Box manicotti noodles

1 Jar spaghetti sauce

Brown meats; halfway through add onion.

When all the pink is gone, drain and add 1 cup mozzarella, cottage cheese and garlic salt.

Boil manicotti and drain. Stuff the meat mixture into noodles. Use a 9 x 12-inch baking pan.

Put 1/2 cup sauce in bottom of pan. Spread around and put stuffed noodles on sauce.

After all noodles are stuffed and put in pan, cover with rest of sauce.

Spread evenly.

Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

Sprinkle with remaining cheese and return to oven for 15 minutes or until cheese is melted.

IRS Warns Taxpayers of Numerous Tax Scams Nationwide; Provides Summary of Most Recent Schemes

Some of the most prevalent IRS impersonation scams include:

- 1. Requesting fake tax payments:
- Targeting students and parents and demanding payment for a fake "Federal Student Tax":
- 3. Sending a fraudulent IRS bill for tax year 2015 related to the Affordable Care Act:
- 4. Soliciting W-2 information
- 5. Imitating software providers
- 6. "Verifying" tax return information over the phone:
- 7. Pretending to be from the tax preparation industry.

If you receive an unexpected call, unsolicited email, letter or text from someone claiming to be the IRS, here are some things you may want to do.

- Do not give out any information. Hang up immediately.
- Contact TIGTA to report the call.
 Use their "IRS Impersonation Scam Reporting" web page or call 800-366-4484.
- Report it to the Federal Trade Commission.
 Use the "FTC Complaint Assistant" on
 FTC.gov. Add "IRS Telephone Scam" in the
 notes
- 4. If you think you might owe taxes, call the IRS directly at *800-829-1040*.

Hello fellow gardeners!

January is Southern California's first month of
Spring. One can expect to see Quince, blooming
Almond, Flowering Pear, early Daffodils and Crocus

flowers.

From a plant's point of view, we have no real winter here. Temperatures which seem really cold to us are perfectly comfortable for the vast majority of our plants. They will bloom throughout the winter if given even the smallest encouragement.

Bare-root roses are appearing in garden centers, even though the roses in our gardens are still in flower. For the best health of your roses, encourage them to go dormant for a few weeks. The rest is important to their longevity, resulting in more perfect and larger flowers. Cut back roses hard this month. When pruning, consider the proper shaping of plants. Eliminate all weak or dead growth and crossing branches. Strip off and dispose of all remaining leaves. Leaves left on the plant may result in disease and insects. Examine plant canes and you may see tiny green swellings of dormant leaf buds. Make cuts just above one of these buds and always choose an outward facing bud. This will encourage roses to develop a pleasing shape. After replanting, they will begin producing new growth.

Remember, Hybrid Tea roses bloom only on new wood and without regular pruning they will not continue to produce.

Besides roses, garden centers are also offering bareroot fruit trees. Dwarf selections are ideal for small yards. They bear fruit, are easier to harvest, and are a good size for small gardens.

Flowering peaches have lovely flowers and are closely related to double roses.

If you haven't been successful getting winter color planted before Christmas, it's still not too late.

Primroses have stunning color and love cold weather. This also applies to Violas, Iceland Poppies, Calendula, Sweet Alyssum, Calibrachoa, and most other winter flowering annuals and perennials.

Continue to bait for snails if necessary. Watch for gophers which are more active in winter and spring. Garden centers offer traps, baits and gas bombs to deal with them. They can be very difficult to eliminate.

New garden catalogs are published this month. It's also a good time to start fun seeds such as mixed cacti. They are easy to grow and there's often a surprise in each packet.
