#### Dear Mountain View Homeowners:

At the June 24, 2015 board meeting the 2015/2016 budget was approved. It calls for an increase in HOA fees of \$5.25 per month. The HOA fees will be \$122.25 per month starting in August. The primary reason for the increase is the contribution to our reserve fund.

We have over \$900,000 in our reserve fund. This fund is for the replacement of items like roads, entry gates, the clubhouse furniture, irrigation equipment, etc. As required by California Civil Code Section 5550 we have a qualified reserve analyst review our facilities and reserve funds and calculate how much we need to keep it fully funded. This year the reserve study calls for an increase of \$4.58 per month. The remaining increase in the monthly HOA fee of \$.67 was due to an increase in operating costs such as utilities, upkeep of the pool, and administrative expenses.

The Architectural Review Committee (ARC) and the Board are looking at vinyl fencing. We should have something out to you by August. It will require one month of comments by the homeowners before it can be approved by the Board. If you are planning on replacing your fence, the approved guidelines, including vinyl fencing, should be available by September or October.

The ARC reported that homeowners are still making improvements to their homes either without ARC authorization or making changes to already approved plans without gaining consent for the changes. We have a diligent group of homeowners who serve on the ARC and try to keep our community looking nice. They evaluate each application to ensure that the improvements are in keeping with the overall design of our community. The risk a homeowner takes for not obtaining ARC approval is that the improvements would be denied and have to be removed. In addition, fines would be imposed. Remember, it will cost you money for management to send a violation letter. It will cost even more money when a letter from the HOA attorney is sent. Take the time to get all improvements approved INCLUDING any additions or changes to original plans.

A question was asked as to why Board members don't get together in advance of a meeting to discuss issues so that they are ready to make decisions. Or, if something needs approval why doesn't the Board just meet and approve it. Often the first time the Board has had a chance to discuss an issue is at an open meeting. The law requires that such discussions take place in front of all attending homeowners and we have to follow a process. First, a meeting needs to be scheduled on a date when all 5 Board members are available. Secondly, an agenda needs to be created and posted 4 days prior to the meeting. Thirdly, minutes need to be kept and forwarded to our property manager, and fourthly, it takes at least one week and usually longer to schedule a special meeting.





## Spotlight

Our spotlight this month will focus on Grandview neighbor Richard Dozier. Richard is a twelve year member of The Moreno Valley Historical Society where he served as president for six years.

The Moreno Valley Historical Society was organized in October, 1984. The purpose of the Society is to meet with others interested in collecting and preserving the heritage of the Moreno Valley area; to search out and enjoy the findings as well as to establish a bounty of historical items for generations to come.



Future goals of the society include collecting oral histories, photographs and documents; preparing historical publications; increasing historical society membership; preparing effective publicity; organizing successful special events; fund raising; preservation and restoration of buildings; and designing historical

landmarks. The Society asks that residents save their old photographs, letters, maps, documents, books and artifacts. Old telephone directories, old newspapers, etc., are most welcome. The Society offers annual memberships and accepts donations.

Here are some historical facts Richard thinks you might find interesting about our city:



In the early 1800s the fabled Butterfield Stage Line established a station in Moreno Valley. Wyatt Earp passed through frequently and lived in the general area. Frank and

Jessie James were occasional visitors en route to a favorite spot in the Elsinore Mountains.

In 1890 the Bear Valley and Alessandro Development Company established the town of Moreno about five miles to the east of Alessandro and named it in honor of Frank E. Brown, who was instrumental in the land and water development plan. (Moreno means brown in Spanish) With great fanfare, water from Big Bear Lake arrived inbothMoreno and Alessandro, and land that had previously sold for \$1.25 an acre was commanding \$100. The Sunnymead Orchard ract was developed in 1912 alongside a roadway from Riverside eastward to Hemet and the Banning Pass.



In the waning days of World War One, the War Department established an Air Corps training base at the old Alessandro town site in 1918, naming it March Field. Through the years, the base

became one of the most important in the Air Force, and today is the largest base in the country for Air Reserve forces.

To the north of March Field is Box
Springs Mountain, so named because
early pioneers "boxed in" a spring of cool,
fresh water for the convenience of
travelers on the old San BernardinoTemecula wagon road (Hwy 395) that
approximated the route of today's Interstate 215.

Today Moreno Valley is Riverside County's second largest city and is renowned for its parks and recreation facilities.

Richard currently serves as an Economic Development Specialist for Riverside County where



he runs the Office of
Foreign Trade. This
office encourages
manufacturers in
Riverside County to
expand markets
overseas. He also
manages the Office of
Film and Television for
Riverside County. This

department encourages television and film makers to shoot movies and commercials in Moreno Valley which helps improve the local economy.

Richard notes, "that the Moreno Valley Historical Society is saving money in order to develop a historic museum. We are attempting to purchase an actual historic building in order to make the museum more significant".

## The Green Thumb Corner

Greetings, Green-Thumbers!

Well, we are now into July and our focus remains on keeping our gardens watered.

If you are planning on making serious changes to your landscaping this is an ideal time to draw up plans. Before choosing trees and shrubs consider the following and do your research:

- Is the plant evergreen or deciduous? "Evergreen" is not necessarily synonymous with tidiness. Some evergreen trees create considerable litter.
- Flowering trees which bear fruits can be unsightly, stain pavement, germinate readily and create bothersome seedlings.
- Tree roots can be a problem so try to find a specimen of the plant nearby. Talk to the homeowner. Find out the pros and cons.
- Other points to consider: overall size when grown; growth rate; season of bloom; drought tolerance; brittleness in high winds and heat and cold tolerance. Considering these points will help prevent unwanted surprises later.
- If you are considering removing turf you have options. The beautiful, new community changes have enormous "curb appeal." I suggest that you determine which of these you like and research design, materials and cost.

The dog days are also a favorable time to do some indoor gardening. Check out the colorful seed catalogs from <a href="Park's Seeds">Park's Seeds</a>

(www.parkseed.com/) and Thompson and Morgan Seeds (www.tmseeds.com/). You can buy inexpensive little greenhouse kits called "seed starter kits' at Lowe's and Home Depot. Read the directions and enjoy your success.

Continue to check your garden for pests. Most plant pests may be killed or discouraged by the use of harmless controls. Aphids and scale insects will die if sprayed directly with a mixture combining 1 pint of water, I teaspoon liquid dish detergent (not the automatic dishwasher kind), and one tablespoon of vegetable oil. For gophers, flooding may be successful on level ground, but gophers present real problems. Their tunnels are elaborate and unless they are trapped we can't be certain of success. Owls, roadrunners, hawks and falcons, and gopher snakes successfully control gophers. See gopher snake photo included. This is a harmless, non-venomous reptile that is also a formidable foe of undesired rodents. Everyone benefits if they are allowed to do their job.

Live snails may be purchased for control of garden snails. Begin with fifty to one hundred and scatter them liberally throughout your garden. You won't often see them as they hide in the soil by day and come out at night.

#### Stuffed Red Peppers

1/3 cup chopped mushrooms

1/3 cup shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese

3 cherry tomatoes, chopped

1 TBS seasoned dried bread crumbs

1 tsp olive oil

1 tsp balsamic vinegar

1 clove garlic, finely chopped

½ tsp dried basil

1 red bell pepper, seeded and cut in half lengthwise

Preheat oven to 375.

Combine all ingredients except bell peppers in a small bowl; mix well.

Fill each bell pepper with half of the stuffing mix and place on a baking sheet or in a baking pan.

Bake for 30-35 minutes or until bell peppers are Tender.
