DELINQUENCY STATUS REPORT:

As of May 31, 2019, there is a total \$6,891.38 in delinquent assessments. This value represents an approximate delinquency rate of 1.7%, as compared to the March 31, 2019 delinquency rate of 1.58%.

COMMITTEE AND MANAGEMENT UPDATES:

Finance: We procured a \$100K CD with 2.5% return and \$58K CD with 2.35% return. Our finances and budget look good.

Social: Independence Day Party June 30, TGIF July 26, and Volunteer Dinner Sept 1.

Facilities: Dogs are not allowed in pool area. Two dogs were brought there by residents. ProFitness will instruct and demonstrate new gym equipment use July 3. Gym towel dispenser will be relocated. Parking lot needs new light fixture. Tennis court bench peeling will be repaired.

Landscape: Proposals for plantings at gates and mulching were presented and approved by Board. Palm tree trimming will be scheduled. Clubhouse area will be closed at that time. A diseased olive tree was noted by tennis court and will be removed.

Communications: Newsletter revenue exceeds cost by \$2316 for fiscal year (August/2018-July/2019). Updated excess will be requested for Social Club at July HOA Board meeting. In-house printing continues to save us money.

Clubhouse Renovation: A couple of delays: New window treatments will be installed in July. The 28 new multifunction chairs are now expected in July. Swivel stools for bistro tables arrived and must be assembled. Utility shed is not yet selected. Wall décor and acoustics will be addressed when all else is done.

CREAMY CHEESE SCALLOPED POTATOES

Ingredients

2 Tbs Butter

2 Tbs Flour

3/4 Tsp Salt

Dash Pepper

11/3 Cups 2% Milk

2 Medium potatoes, (Peeled and thinly sliced)

2 Tbs finely chopped onion

1/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Directions

Melt butter in a small saucepan.
Stir in flour, salt and pepper until smooth.
Gradually stir in milk and bring to a boil.
Cook and stir until thickened.

- In a 1-quart baking dish
 - o Coated with cooking spray.
- Layer half of the potatoes, onion and half of the sauce.
- Top with remaining potatoes and sauce.

Cover and bake at 375 degrees for 30 minutes.

Uncover and sprinkle with shredded cheddar cheese.

Bake an additional 10 to 15 minutes longer or until potatoes are tender.

Hello fellow gardeners,

I am commonly asked questions concerning what plants will grow in shade. Most people want to add color to areas of shade in their gardens but have been unsuccessful. Admittedly, the list of plants which will grow in shade is not as long as those which enjoy more light. But in our hot inland climate, many plants recommended for sun will actually prefer shade or part shade.

It is important to understand the differing degrees of shade typical in the average yard. Deep shade, such as one might find under a densely leafy tree or under a North facing patio, is a huge challenge, as they will receive little or no direct sunlight. Options under these conditions may limit one to non-flowering plants such as ferns, and various shrubs not grown for flowers.

Most of us have an area with morning sun on the east side of our house. This is the best arrangement for the widest variety of flowering plants. The morning sun is considerably cooler than afternoon sun; So sun sensitive plants will gain protection and thrive.

Here are some examples of plants suited to grow in morning sun:

- Tree ferns, Mahonia, also known as "California Holly"(Mahonia bealei and M. Iomariifolia).
- Pittosporum, which has fragrant early summer flowers that smell like orange blossoms.
- Japanese privet (Ligustrum Euonymus, with foliage in gold, green, or silver Abutilon, also known as "Flowering Maple".
- Acanthus (Acanthus mollis); a tropical looking large leaved perrenial, also known as "Bear's Breeches".
- Daylily Agapanthus, is a perennial available in various shades of violet blue or white. Snow-bush (breynia). This is a tender perennial in our region, but worth growing as a summer annual for its colorful foliage and dainty growth habit.
- > Bergenia, an old fashion, perennial which flowers in midwinter.
- Fuchsias, all varieties, best in hanging baskets.

- Impatiens, available in a vast array of colors. Cymbidium, the only orchid hardy enough to grow outdoors year-round in our climate.
- Epiphyllums, rainforest Cacti which are available in nearly every color imaginable, and sometimes sport flowers as large as a dinner plate.

Best in hanging baskets, Begonias, including tuberous begonias Coleus are available in an infinite number of varieties and colors. Geraniums (Pelargonium) drought tolerant and carefree.

Azalea, acidic soil Camellias, acidic soil Hydrangeas, acidic soil Caladiums, colorful foliage grows rapidly from spring planted tubers and all shade-loving annuals and perennials.
