DELINQUENCY STATUS REPORT:

As of April 30, 2017, there is a total of \$3,568.75 in delinquent assessments. This value represents an approximate delinquency rate of 1.00%, as compared to the last delinquency rate of 1.02% on March 31, 2017.

COMMITTEE UPDATES:

Reports were given by the Finance, Architecture, Social, Facility, Communications, Landscape, and Neighborhood Watch committees.

Finance Committee: Our finances are in good shape A CD is coming due in December and must be looked at.

Architecture Committee: This was a busy month. It is still difficult to get Notices of Completion.

Social Club: Approval was requested and received for "Bid Whist" players on 2^{nd} Saturdays from 4 - 7pm led by Sharol Lewis. A farewell gathering at the pool for JoAnn Foronjy is planned for June 14^{th} .

Landscape Committee: Half of the iceberg roses have been replaced with attractive plants at the entrances and parking lot. Proposals will be addressed at the next meeting for the pool area and for additional iceberg rose removal.

Facilities Committee: A new access system was installed at the Cactus Gate. Ducks at the pool should be discouraged and not fed. They contaminate the area and compromise the pool chemical balance.

Communications Committee: Printer usage and Newsletter cost reports were submitted. New ad money reduced the cost of this month's Newsletter to \$10. Dan and Victoria Klaas have volunteered to be lead distributors of the Newsletter. **Neighborhood Watch Committee**: Garage Sale went well with few incidents. A lost dog has a new home in neighborhood. Some kids taking shortcuts and a guy going door to door with a clipboard were asked to leave the community.

BOARD ACTIONS:

The Board accepted the minutes and reports from the Committees' recent meetings as presented.

Residential Fence Painting: The current form and guidelines were discussed and revisions suggested.

HOMEOWNER FORUM:

Dead Lawns: Management will begin enforcing the ban on dead lawns and weeds. Residents with such lawns are required to either restore their lawns or install approved turf and/or landscaping.

Ducks at the Pool: We will ask an animal control company for help in relocating them.

Social Club Continuation: A plan will be presented at the next meeting.

Grandma's Secrets.....

Grandmas believe in the "use it up, wear it out, make it do or do without philosophy". They have some really good 'down to earth, simple, life knowledge' tucked away in their heads. They are careful with their money and are always searching for a way to clean it, fix it or find a part that will make it like new. Let's explore some of their ideas and in doing so, perhaps learn a few things.

Kind of a Neat Idea for Fire

If you are a camper or hiker, carry a steel-wool pad and a small 9-volt battery (in separate containers) with you in your backpack. To light a fire, gather some tinder-dry material (lint from your pockets will do) and touch the terminals of the battery to the steel wool. Sparks will erupt and light the tinder. Magic time!

Cleaning Stained Windows

The Green Thumb Corner By Victoria Klaas

This month we need to begin watering our gardens regularly. Trees require a soaking once a month. We want to encourage tree roots to grow deep and light watering encourages shallow surface rooting. Well maintained trees help keep our community beautiful and healthy.

June is not a good month to add new plants. You can do so but water diligently. Doing so will allow them to establish deep roots in order to survive a day or two without irrigation.

Do not feed any newly planted trees or shrubs! However, established plants like Jacaranda trees, Bottlebush trees, Southern Magnolias, Hibiscus, Lantana, Bougainvillea and Mandevilla should be lightly fed according to package directions.

Feed Azaleas, Camellias and Gardenias, a fertilizer specifically for plants that prefer acidic soil. This will lower the PH beneath the plants to an acceptable range. It may be necessary to re-apply each month of the growing season. Iron deficiency chlorosis is common in plants. You may see yellow leaves with dark green veins. Most often seen on Gardenias, it can also be found on other plants. Growth can be stunted and blooms poor. Apply an iron supplement like "Ironite" to the soil under the dripline. Avoid spilling iron pellets as they stain sidewalks and driveways when wet.

Hibiscus plants require a high potassium, low nitrogen fertilizer. Tomato fertilizer with a high percentage of potassium is ideal. As a general rule, if a plant is growing fast and blooming heavily, it should be fed two or three times during its active growing season in order to replace what it removes from the soil.

Did you know that Queen Palms are accurate barometers of healthy soil? If the leaves are yellow or growth is stunted use palm tree fertilizer spikes as directed. They will feed for an entire year. Spikes are also available for Citrus trees and shrubs. <u>Please note</u>: trees and shrubs may still require supplemental iron even if using tree spikes. Spikes are also available for shrubs. You can fertilize and add supplemental iron at the same time. It's time to raise the height of your lawn mower to allow the grass to grow slightly taller. This shades the vulnerable root zone and prevents scalding. Be sure to check your sprinklers for adequate coverage.

Warm Chicken and Spinach Salad

(Makes two servings. Add crusty bread!)

½ bag of baby spinach
½ lb asparagus (bottom snapped off and cut diagonally into about 1 inch pieces)
2 heaping TBS finely chopped green onion
1 tsp olive oil; ½ tsp olive oil
3 TBS water
½ pound chicken breast tenders (I cut into smaller pieces)
Salt and pepper to taste
Dressing:
1 ½ tsp Balsamic vinegar

½ tsp Balsamic vinegar
 ½ tsp lemon juice
 ¼ tsp Dijon mustard
 1/8 tsp sugar
 ½ tsp olive oil
 Salt and pepper to taste

Spread spinach on a plate; set aside. In non-stick skillet, heat 1 tsp olive oil over medium high heat until hot. Add asparagus and onion; cook for about 5 minutes or until golden. Reduce heat and add water. Cook covered for 5 minutes or until asparagus is tender. Spoon asparagus mixture over spinach. In same skillet increase heat and add ½ tsp olive oil. Cook chicken seasoned with salt and pepper to taste for about 5 minutes or until chicken loses its pink color throughout. Turn chicken once while cooking. Add chicken to salad. Wisk together with vinegar, lemon juice, mustard, sugar and the 1 ½ tsp olive oil. Add salt and pepper to taste. Add dressing to hot skillet, stir until hot. Drizzle over chicken and vegetables.
