Homeowners and Residents of Mountain View

Last night I enjoyed seeing new and old residents at our Board Meeting. It is becoming the norm to have a great crowd at the meetings. The Board is grateful for your support and your participation. I can't say it enough. This is your community and, for most of us, our biggest investment. Attending the Board Meetings is a way for you to make your voice heard.

I have previously warned you about phone scams, but I want to do it again. The senior community is a particular target for scammers because we are trusting and at times, a little naive. In a two-day period, I received five calls from the same scammers. It is a recorded man's voice saying there has been a case opened on my social security number because there has been suspicious activity on my account, so my number has been suspended. I accidentally called one of the numbers back and it had been disconnected. I can't say it with enough emphasis, don't bite on it. They are just trying to get you to give them your social security number so they can get to your accounts and investments. Protect yourself by being suspicious about anyone but your family. Believe me, strangers are not interested in your best interest.

We've had a few questions about residents renting the clubhouse. I should, but don't know all of the rules that apply too rentals, Dan Klaas knows because he is the man in charge of clubhouse rentals. One of the things I do know is that you will need to either get a rider on your homeowner's insurance or take a separate plan to cover the day of your rental. Some of our homeowner's plans cover at no charge, some have an extra fee, while others don't provide the coverage at all. When they don't provide the coverage at all this is where Dan may be able to give you an idea of where others have obtained the coverage. Sorry about putting you on the spot Dan, but I missed you last night.

While I am talking about the clubhouse use, I just wanted to cover some of the other rules we have for its use. For the most part, the Social Club oversees it. The Club has committees that are authorized to use it. Each Committee Chair is then responsible for the occupancy during the time of their program. I will use the card group as an example since I participate in playing. Twila DeWalt is the contact person for cards. She makes sure we have enough cards to play any number of games. She usually suggests what the game or games are for the day and sets it all up. After we are done playing, she makes sure things are put away and the clubhouse is restored to its previous setting or condition. Now the clubhouse use for cards comes before other users, unless there is an emergency. If there were enough players to fill both the main room and the bar room, then their use comes first. If there are only two or three tables of players, someone else could use the bar room or the billiards room while cards are being played in the main room. There are doors between the main room and the bar room, the main room and the billiards room. The doors are there to allow secondary users whenever possible. We have a small clubhouse and we are a small community. The clubhouse should be shared whenever necessary and possible. The only time there is exclusive use of the clubhouse is for a memorial or a paid rental, I can't think of any other use that allows for exclusivity.

The Renovation Committee is still working on some of the finishing touches for the clubhouse. I don't know if there is anyone else as anxious for its completion as I am. We still need the chairs for the tables, a couple of occasional tables to make up the conversational groupings, the window treatments and final decorative items like wall hangings and such. Oh yes, and a couple of bar stools. I am so excited to have it all done. I have heard so many good things about what has been done to date. I do worry about those leather chairs in the main room though.

Enjoy the warm weather and being outside. We still have a couple of vacancies for volunteers. We need a Facilities Chair and someone as a Landscape Committee Member.

DELINQUENCY STATUS REPORT:

As of March 31, 2019, there is a total \$5,712.10 in delinquent assessments. This value represents an approximate delinquency rate of 1.60%, as compared to the Feb. 28, 2019 delinquency rate of 1.58%.

COMMITTEE AND MANAGEMENT UPDATES:

Finance: March statement and 2019 Reserve Study were reviewed. Approval recommended (See Reserve Study on Agenda). Our financial outlook is good. 2-year CD recommended.

Social: Discovery Luncheon and Fashion Show on May 15. Memorial Day BBQ on May 26. Independence Day Party June 30 with live music.

Architectural (ARC): Many new project-starts. Need samples of new paint selections. Most Notices of Completion have been submitted.

Landscape: (See Landscape Proposals on agenda.) A third proposal, for Cactus entry, may be modified to include annuals. Putting green turf will be replaced by mulch and trees will be thinned in the area. Olive trees were sprayed to reduce fruit droppings

Communications: Newsletter revenue exceeds cost by \$1907 for this fiscal year (August/18-July/19). Excess will be requested for Social Club in August.

Neighborhood Watch: (See Speeding on agenda.) Committee suspended for lack of chair.

Clubhouse Renovation: Window Treatment Vendor is being approved by BCS. Window treatments have been selected. Some furnishings have arrived, others have been ordered, and others are TBD.

Management: A proposal for replacement of patio shades was discussed. Two alternative options were suggested by Fred Humphrey for possible proposal.

Rattle Those Pots and Pans

Oven Roasted Potatoes

(Shared By Chuck Hedger)

Ingredients

2 ½ Lbs. Yukon Gold Potatoes (Peeled)

1 ½ Tbs. Melted Butter

3 to 4 Tbs. Olive Oil

1 Tbs. Flour

Salt and Ground Black Pepper

1 Tbs. Italian Seasonings

Directions

- Preheat oven to 400 degrees.
- Cut potatoes into 1-inch cubes and add to a saucepan.
- Sprinkle with salt and cover with cold water.
- Bring to a full boil, then reduce heat and simmer for 3 minutes.
- > Drain well and set aside.
- Combine melted butter and olive oil on a large, shallow baking pan (about 17 X 11 inches).
- Tilt the baking pan back and forth to coat the surface evenly. If it doesn't cover the surface completely, add a little more oil.
- Place the pan in the oven for 5 minutes to preheat the butter/oil mixture.
- Dust the potatoes lightly with flour, tossing to coat as evenly as possible.
- Spread the potatoes onto the hot butter and oil mixture pan.
- Spread them into a single layer, allowing for a little space between each potato.
- Roast until browned and crisp,
 - o about 45 to 50 minutes.
- Season with salt, pepper and Italian seasonings.

The Green Thumb Corner

Hello neighbors and fellow gardeners,

Earlier this month, one of our neighbors asked the following question:

Hello Victoria,

I have a Gardenia shrub and was wondering why it has so many yellow leaves. I just don't know what to do.

Hello Gardenia Owner,

Gardenias are unquestionably beautiful plants. However, they do require a bit of maintenance.

One problem that plagues gardeners is a Gardenia bush with yellow leaves. Yellow leaves are a sign of chlorosis in plants. Chlorosis is the abnormal reduction or loss of the normal green coloration of leaves of plants.

Determining the cause of chlorosis in Gardenia bushes can involve some trial and error.

Chlorosis in our region is usually caused by a low soil PH. Our soil is alkaline and so is our water. Gardenias require a high PH or slightly acidic soil.

Chlorosis will appear as yellow leaves with green veins if the soil is alkaline. Gardenias need a light humus soil containing lots of composted material. Compost produces humic acid on which Gardenias thrive.

Another cause for Chlorosis in Gardenias is iron deficiency. Gardenias simply can't take up soil iron (which is usually plentiful) if the soil is alkaline. So, feed Gardenias monthly in summer (May through August) with a commercial fertilizer formulated for plants which require acidic growing conditions. It will be marketed as "acid" and may be used on Gardenias, Hydrangeas, free ferns, and most shade loving plants which prefer rich, humusy soil. Also supplement with granular or liquid iron one or two times in summer. You should also be aware that iron supplements can leave rust stains on pavement, so use with care.

Poorly drained soil can also cause yellowing and leaf drop, as the plant's roots are drowning and starved for oxygen. The remedy is to loosen the soil and dig in lots of compost, either bagged or home cultured.

The last thing that can cause Chlorosis is Magnesium deficiency. This can be identified when the leaves at the base of branches are yellow while tips remain green. A dose of magnesium, or Epsom salts, will help. Use about a quarter of a cup per shrub.

Try to keep fertilizers and other supplements away from the trunk; apply under the shrub's "drip zone," or three feet from the trunk.

I hope this helps.
