I can't help but thank those of you who attended the HOA Meeting last night. It was a rousing meeting with a lot of passion shown by many of you. To me, the passion shown means a real love and concern for our community. Passion is what we need to keep the community great. Now, take that passion a little step further and give real consideration to running for the Board. This coming election will have three positions up for consideration, including mine. Yes, I guess you could consider me a lame duck. I will not be running again. I have been on the Board for six years and it is time for someone else to take the helm. I have loved almost every minute and know I will be sad and sorry at times for not running, but I have things to do and places to go so I need to move on. Step up and show what you are made of by putting your name in the proverbial hat.

The Board is still working on a number of things to increase the security of our community property. Three new cameras were added to allow additional opportunities for recognition when vandalism and/or theft occur. Now don't get excited, nothing huge has happened, just little things. However, little things sometimes lead to bigger things. We're just trying to be a step ahead of anything significant. You can help by keeping your eyes and ears open to questionable things happening. Personally, I find it hard to believe that anyone who is a homeowner would do anything to hurt the community as we all have a vested interest here. However, there are people from the outside who derive some kind of sadistic thrill by hurting others. Again, keep your eyes and ears open and don't hesitate to report anything unusual to the Neighborhood Watch Committee or even the Moreno Valley Police Department.

Speaking of identifying, we all should have a FOB for use when entering the pool, clubhouse and gym. We also should have a universal gate key for the pedestrian gates and the tennis/pickleball courts. The management company has asked that we only use our FOBs for ourselves and guests. From time to time an occasional resident or homeowner may have lost their community privileges as a result of fines or dues being unpaid or in arrears. In those cases, the FOB has been turned off and privileges revoked until the issue has been resolved. They are asking us not to open the pool gate or building doors for anyone. Everyone should use their own FOB.

One other thing about FOBS and keys. When you sell your home or move out, make sure you give these things to the new resident. This is really important in helping with the security of our community. We have had a number of people entering the community and community property using FOBs, vehicle gate openers and pedestrian keys from previous residents. Help guard our community by not allowing these access items to fall into the wrong hands.

One other area of interest would be that the Management Company is getting bids for us to replace the red quarry tiles in the pool area, in front of the fireplace, and just outside of the Billiards Room door.

A second thought is that we just had the air conditioners and furnace serviced. The techs emphasized that we not block the return vent just inside of the right side door to the barroom. The new brown chairs are the suspects! Those of us who feel we have decorator insights need to make sure a chair is NOT placed in front of the vent. If the vent continues to get blocked, we will burn out the unit. Please keep this in mind when arranging the furniture!

Oh yes, one other thing, the heater for the pool is usually turned off for the winter months starting December 1<sup>st</sup>. The Board hasn't discussed it yet but plan accordingly.

### Pumpkin Soup With Crumbled Bacon and Toasted Pumpkin Seeds

### <u>Ingredients</u>

- 2 Teaspoons Olive Oil
  ½ Cup Raw Pumpkin Seeks
  1 Onion, Chopped
  1 Teaspoon Kosher Salt
  ½ Teaspoon Chipotle Chili Powder
  ½ Teaspoon Black Pepper
  2 Cans (29 Oz Each) Solid-pack Pumpkin
- 4 Cups Chicken Stock or Broth
- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> Cup Apple Cider
- 1/2 Cup Whipping Cream Sour Cream (Optional)
- 3 Slices Thick-Sliced Bacon, Crisp-Cooked and Crumbled.

### Directions (Slow Cooker)

- Heat oil in medium nonstick skillet over medium heat.
  - Add pumpkin seeds; cook and stir for 1 minute or until seeds begin to pop.
  - Remove to small bowl; cool completely.
- Spray inside of slow cooker with nonstick cooking spray.
  - Add onion to same skillet; cook and stir over medium heat until translucent.
  - Stir in salt, chipotle powder and black pepper.
  - Transfer to prepared slow cooker.
     Whisk in pumpkin, chicken stock and apple cider until smooth.
  - Cover; cook on HIGH 4 hours.
- Turn off slow cooker.
  - Whisk in whipping cream.
  - Strain soup through fine mesh strainer; discard solids.
- Ladle soup into bowls; top evenly with sour cream, pumpkin seeds and bacon, if desired.

### The Green Thumb Corner

### Greetings Fellow Gardeners,

November is the loveliest month of the year. The nights are cold, and the days are warm. This is a great time to plant small space gardens.

If you have a small garden space, it is really important to plan carefully.

To begin, measure the length and width of your borders and use graph paper to draw your design ideas.

Choose plants that grow slowly, require little pruning and make little or no litter.

For colorful garden borders, use foliage rather than blooms. Purple, bronze, red and black leaves are gorgeous when planted where the light can shine through the leaves. Plants with gold or yellow foliage tend to mimic the strong rays of the sun and will "warm up" a garden when paired with orange or red leaved plants. Yellow leaved plants are also compatible with purple leaved plants and blue flowers. Using plants with contrasting leaf colors, shapes, and texture is preferable. They offer an interesting combination.

Texture can create an illusion of spaciousness. Coarse textured plants will appear closer. Fine textured plants will tend to recede. Fine textured plants may be used to make a shallow garden seem deeper.

How you will view your garden should be factored into your plan. The areas you see most often can be designed as all-season beds. You could include items such as evergreens and deciduous shrubs with interesting branch structure and early and late blooming perennials.

Remember, less is more in gardens. A mirror added to the garden reflects light and adds a multiplier effect to the plants and colors.

Want to hide unwanted views? Consider planting a tree or Conifer hedge as a screen. If you use a Conifer hedge, plant the fewest number needed.

Short screens in deck pots also work. Use a long, rectangular container for three plants or a single specimen tree planted in a good-sized pot.

When choosing the plants for a compact garden, choose plants that fit. A wide spreading tree will suffer in too narrow a space.

Dwarf cultivars offer leaf shapes and flower color that are admired in larger plants.

Try the Hick's Yew ('Hicksii'). It grows only four feet wide. Choose a dwarf plant for an accent in a container for small mixed landscapes.

The Mugo Pine is a landscaper's dream. They have rich, deep green needles and a compact mounded habit. The largest can grow to only about ten feet tall.

Small gardens are usually shaded by buildings or tall trees. Choose part shade plants for partial sun areas and plant the denser shade sections with variegated selections that will brighten the darkness.

Don't overlook succulent plants. They seldom require much in the way of pruning and are lovely to look at.
