THE HOA BOARD LETTER

Behind the scenes are the committees that make the Mountain View Community Association work. Our HOA is not large enough to hire a full-time staff. These committee members oversee their areas of responsibility and perform some of the routine maintenance jobs that normally would be done by a full-time staff member.

New thermometers in the pool and spa, clothes hangers in the men's and women's restrooms in the pool area, a water hose and reel in the pool area, a thorough inspection of all the outside lights in the common areas, etc.—these are just a few of the things the Facilities Committee has done recently. Don Papiernik is the chairperson. Also on the committee are Ed Burt, Al Martinez, George Sweeney, and Charlie Foronjy.

One of the big challenges that faces Mountain View is ensuring that every homeowner's file is complete. This includes landscaping forms and approvals. Letters are being sent to all homeowners who have not filed forms nor completed their backyard landscaping. If you receive a letter and have previously filed forms, call Carol Foster. She will work with you to update your file. George Podolsky is the chairperson of the Architectural Review Committee. Also on the Committee are Ed Burt, Jerry Little, Paula Podolsky, Ron Sais, Donna Sandoval and Sharon Shavce.

The Finance Committee reviews the HOA accounting and financial reports each month and makes a recommendation to the Board for acceptance or disapproval. Bob Majcherek is the chairperson. Jim McCaffrey and Frank Pavlik are members.

Each month the Landscape Committee tours a section of Mountain View with the maintenance company and Prescott. They make recommendations for maintenance, flower selection, new plantings, etc. Carol Sweeney is the chairperson. Godfrey Asciak, Charlotte Lillard and George Sweeney are members.

The Website Committee designs and maintains our website on the internet. Darryl Householder is the webmaster. Sue Janssen is the chief-in-charge. Members are Mary Kimberlin and Dennis Trimble.

The Social Committee is headed up by Jo Pavlik with Sharon Cristino, vice chairperson; Marilyn Dawson, secretary; and Godfrey Asciak, treasurer. The Social Club committees and their activities are too numerous to list in this letter. MEETING HIGHLIGHTS—SEPTEMBER 21, 2005

BOARD ACTION: Approved Financials for July 2005: Total operating assets are \$121,304.70. Total reserves are \$227,529.14. Total assets are \$248,833.92. Total equity and liability are \$348,833.92. The Association is operating on a monthly assessment of \$101.00 as of August 1, 2005.

Additional bids are needed for street sweeping services. The purchase of decals was approved to display the number and type of pets in each home, to inform firemen and police in case of an emergency. In November, a steering committee will be formed to establish a Community Disaster Preparedness Program. Katrina was a “wake up” call.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Facilities: Charles Foronjy is a new member to the committee. Completed installation of hooks in pool restrooms. Purchased a reel for patio hose. Also purchased new handrail covers for the pool. Reviewed all light installations. Discussed the installation of a drain for the putting green. Recommended further discussion of this issue with Landscape Committee. Installation of shelving for the card room closet has been completed.

Landscape: Proposed hydro seeding on slope area on Grandview. There will be a review and measurement of all common area footage conducted by Artistic Maintenance and the Western Municipal Water District. After completion and adjustments, the HOA should receive a substantial refund from the water district. Water district also suggested the installation of sensors to shut off systems when it rains. Accepted recommendation to install monument letters on the center divider at the JFK entrance, along with plants and illumination.

Architectural Review: Two new members have been added to the committee – Jerry Little and Ron Sais. Approximately 30 notices of application/completion have been received. Committee has been charged with determining what constitutes trim color on homes.

Social Club: Kay Howe is collecting donations for Habitat for Humanity for Katrina Victims. Contact Twyla Dewalt if you are interested in attending a craft class to learn how to make "cozies." October 1st is Casino Night from 6-9 p.m. Jeff Johnson from Moreno Valley Ranch Golf Course will be our speaker for the October 5th Social Club meeting. Halloween party will be held on October 29th.

ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW COMMITTEE

Each month the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) will provide a few excerpts from our governing documents. The excerpt selection may come from concerns by what has been observed in the neighborhood or from a question of a homeowner. Subsequent inputs will come from members of the committee.

The ARC is charged with the responsibility of evaluating the individual merits of each application submitted by a homeowner and ensure that the proposed improvements are compatible with the architectural characteristics of the applicant's house, adjoining houses and the neighborhood setting. Compatibility is defined as similarity in architectural style, quality of workmanship, similar use of materials, color and construction detail.

I would like to thank all who volunteered to be on the Architectural Review Committee. It is great to see that so many people want to be involved in our community.

Q1. I did not submit my Structure and Landscape Improvement Application within a year after moving in. Now that I have submitted my Structure and Landscape Improvement Application how long do I have to complete my improvements?

A1. This will depend on what improvements are going to be done and who is doing the work. Most contractors want to finish the project within 30 days or less. Most homeowners doing the work themselves take longer. To play it safe, you may want to schedule the completion for 90 days.

Q2. What if I find that the work is going to take longer then I put on my Structure and Landscape Improvement Application?

A2. **DO NOT WAIT UNTIL THE LAST DAY** to mail a letter to Carol Foster at The Prescott Company asking for an extension. In the letter, give a detailed explanation of why an extension is required, and be sure to include a new completion date. Remember that waiting until the completion date has passed may result in a fine.

Q3. What if I don't meet the completion date?

A3. Follow the instruction in A2 above. It is important to note that you **WILL NOT** be given one extension after another.

To all homeowners who are submitting a second or third Structure and Landscape Improvement Application—You must submit the application, ARC approval forms and three (3) copies of all drawings to

THE GARDENER'S CORNER

From the gardener's corner...gardening is a pleasure this month. Things are growing slower and the pleasantly cool weather is refreshing to work in after the summer's heat. **Harvest herbs** now for making wreaths or vinegars as holiday presents. If you are lucky enough to have a fresh pumpkin, **toast - don't toss those pumpkin seeds**. Wash the seeds well and separate them from the stringy pulp. Spread them on a cookie sheet and toast them for 3 or 4 minutes at 375 degrees. Stir and toast them another 2 or 3 minutes until they are evenly golden. **Feed citrus and avocados** with a high level of phosphorus and potassium but no nitrogen to toughen them up for winter. Keep them watered until the rains take over. **Discontinue feeding deciduous trees** now to make them cold hardy. Plan your dormant fruit tree spraying schedule to coincide with cool weather holidays – Thanksgiving, New Year's Day and Valentine's Day. Spraying at the precise period of bud swell is important – before the bud swell is too early and after the blossoms open is too late. **Separate and replant crowded clumps of bulbs**. Many will grow well beneath deciduous trees as most of the bulb growth is in the early spring before the trees leaf out.

You can still seed thin spots in your established lawn. After a month of sowing, that area will be ready for mowing. Remember to change your irrigation schedule. Cooler weather slows evaporation and transpiration from plant foliage, so less water is needed.

What's Cooking?

Happy Fall Everyone! I thought it would be good to bring some oldies back. Cooler weather means we can turn the stove back on again. This month's recipe comes from the kitchen of the fun loving Suzanne Werner...Thanks again Suzanne. By the way, I could use some help with new recipes. There's a lot of new folks out there.

FISH STEW

- 6 Tbsp olive oil
- 1 cup of chopped onion
- 2 large garlic cloves, chopped
- 2/3 cups fresh parsley, chopped
- 1 cup of fresh chopped tomato (about 1 large tomato)
- 8 oz of clam juice
- 2/3 cup dry white wine
- 1 lb fish fillets (use halibut, cod, sole, shark, orange roughy) cut into 2" pieces
- 1/2 lb of shrimp
- pinch of oregano, thyme, pepper and a dash of Tabasco.
- 2 tsp of tomato paste.

Heat olive oil in a large pot over medium heat. Add chopped onions and garlic. Saute 4 minutes. Add parsley and cook 2 minutes. Add tomato, tomato paste, seasoning and cook 2 minutes longer. Add clam juice, dry wine, shrimp and fish and simmer until fish is cooked through (about 10 minutes). Ladle into bowls and serve.

Prep time about 25 minutes. (Serves 4)

Tai Chi starts in October. Legend has it that Tai Chi, a Chinese martial art, was invented hundreds of years ago by a Taoist priest named Chang San-Feng after he happened to see a crane fighting a snake. Today, far removed from the mountains of medieval China, people are practicing Tai Chi more for their health than for fighting. The graceful movements are helping people to improve their mobility and balance.

Tai Chi combines meditation with slow, circular motions. Movements are practiced with knees and hip joints slightly bent and deep breathing. Scientific evidence shows that older people with arthritis have less pain and less trouble with daily activities. It has been found that Tai Chi also lowers blood pressure. The class begins with warm-up exercises and ends with 15 minutes of stretching and relaxation.
