Unfortunately, the Architectural Committee and the Board have still not been able to come to a consensus on vinyl fencing. Since the number of requests for landscape changes has diminished, the Board is hoping there will be more time for the two groups to work out an agreement by the October meeting. The many changes in homeowner front yards to drought tolerant landscapes is admirable. The neighborhood looks well-groomed with many different designs. It's great to see and we are, no doubt, saving a great deal of water!

A few points of interest coming this month:

- 1. Our streets are scheduled for slurry-seal and asphalt repair. The exact dates will be announced.

Committee Updates

Homeowner Forum

- A homeowner brought up a safety issue. There needs to be solar lights by the SPA to prevent an accident when walking out of the SPA area. The issue will be added to the agenda for the next board meeting.
- A homeowner stated that the ladder in the library was missing. Board approved Jain Householder to obtain a replacement.
- A homeowner asked the question: "What is the procedure for establishing HOA Board term-limits?" Answer: It may require a change in the CC&R rules. Management will research and report back.

- Board approved July 2015 Financial Statement
- Board authorized management to issue Liens to: __1__ accounts.

Unfinished Business:

- **Community Email Distribution:** Darryl Householder submitted a proposal. After discussion, the item was tabled for • further review by the Board.
- **Rule Change:** Board tabled the approval of ARC rule changes until vinyl fencing rules have been established. There will be a special Open Session meeting in October to meet with ARC and finalize the vinyl fence rule changes. These will be presented at the next regular HOA meeting.
- Wind Screening on Tennis Court: The wind screen on the tennis courts will not be replaced at this time. If for some reason a future problem with the pool and/or the tennis court arises, the Board will re-address the issue at that time.

New Business:

- Asphalt Repair and Slurry Seal Proposals: Board approved the AMS proposal for paving at \$29,625.00. The date of actual repair will be announced at a later date.
- Electrical Outlet Installation Proposal: Board approved the proposals to install new outlets on both gates and remove all eleven (11) deteriorating outlets
- Landscape Proposals:
 - Remove three (3) Pine trees next to the tennis court: Board deferred the decision for removal of the three (3) Pine trees until the next budget cycle.
 - 2. Remove campfire succulents from the front entrance island on Cactus: Board did not approve this item.
- Annual Meeting: The details of the Annual Meeting were discussed by the Board. This is required in an Open Session prior to the ballots being distributed to the membership. The Board appointed 3 homeowners, JoAnn Foronjy, Judy Box and Chuck Hedger as Inspectors of Election, and approved the Annual Meeting and Elections details as presented below.

Snapshot!

Victoria and Dan Klass have been working with the *art of*

copper enameling since 1995. During a trip to Hawaii they saw examples of the art and wondered



if they might pursue it as a business. Dan wanted to take up some type of hobby in metal and Victoria loved drawing. So, learning that an art guild in San Diego was giving lessons in copper enameling, they decided to attend. They bought a used kiln and began learning the process. Victoria drew the design templates and Dan hand cut the designs on 6'x8'

copper sheets. Having been primarily self taught, Victoria jokes, "we threw everything away for the first three years!"

Dan notes that the enameling process goes back to ancient Greece; that archeologists have dated pieces of jewelry to the 13th century. "Although the basics have stayed pretty much the same", he says, "over the centuries many different techniques have evolved".

Victoria develops the template designs which Dan cuts from copper sheets. Finally, the powdered



colors are applied onto the copper in a kiln at temperatures nearing 1000-1600 degrees fahrenheit. The result is a beautiful piece of glass on copper art!

Over the years, Victoria and Dan have sold their art all over the world. They have conducted business on the internet and have shown pieces in art galleries from Laguna Beach to Hawaii. At one point they were so busy

they had three employees working for the business.

These days, however, Victoria says that she and Dan produce art for fun, teaching others how to enamel and spend their days with grandchildren.

Recently, the wind screens were removed from the tennis/pickleball court in order that the fence could be repainted. The Board had planned to replace those screens at an approximate cost of \$2500. After discussion with the community the decision has been made to leave the screens off, unless a problem arises that might require their replacement. We applaud the Board for their decision. We enjoy being able to look through the fence and see the putting green and swimming pool areas. And, those of us who play pickleball love the breeze that is now able to get through the fence. Green Thumb Corner Victoria Klaas

Hello fellow gardeners!

We usually begin to feel autumn weather in mid October; warm, sunny days and cool, nippy nights. This is the ideal time to plant. The exceptions to this are tropical plants (best if planted in the spring) and bare root plants (best if planted in January). Planting in cool weather encourages root growth during winter and early spring. A larger root system encourages a growth surge in the spring.

There are beautiful perennials and annuals that bloom in fall or winter. They provide marvelous color from autumn to spring reaching a crescendo in April. Coolseason annuals include Pansies, Violas, Lobelia, Calendula, Cineraria, Cyclamen, Delphinium, Dianthus, Evergreen Candytuft, flowering Cabbage and flowering Kale, Foxglove, Iceland Poppies, and Sweet Alyssum. Planted early enough, given adequate water, and fertilized lightly at the time of planting, they will begin to bloom before Christmas and continue flowering through spring. If you wait too long to plant them they will not bloom until March or April and die with the first hot days.

Consider a vegetable or herb garden. Generally speaking, plants grown for their roots or leaves will thrive during the cool season. Try lettuce, cabbage, carrots, radishes, or onions.

Divide overgrown clumps of perennials (Day Lilies, Iris, Ginger, Ornamental Asparagus and Clivia). When dividing Irises and Day Lilies, look for the natural divisions between the leaf fans. Carefully saw or pry them apart. Trim the leaves down to 4 inches and replant. Also divisible at this time are Shasta Daisies, Gazanias, Ornamental Grasses, and Fortnight Lilies. Fortnight Lilies are often mistreated by gardeners who shear the leaves causing them to become disfigured and brown. The best way to trim these plants is to dig and divide just as you would Iris or Daylilies.

Ornamental grasses are often pruned incorrectly or not pruned at all. Grasses that bloom in summer should be cut within two inches of the ground at the onset of cold weather. This will prevent the "haystack" look in summer when dead leaves are growing throughout them.

Encourage fruit trees to begin dormancy by withholding fertilizer. It is important that these plants receive a good winter rest for best fruit production and healthier trees. It is not advisable to fertilize Roses again until early spring. Readjust sprinklers to conserve water and check rain gutters for debris that could prevent proper drainage. Consider broadcasting wildflower seeds in garden areas that are difficult to access or hard to maintain. If rain is insufficient, water the seed bed by hand. It is important that seeds not be permitted to dry out. The best mix includes annual flowers, perennials and ornamental grasses. These plants will not only add beauty but will help prevent garden erosion and unwanted weeds.

October is a wonderful outdoor month. So, get outside. Enjoy the fruits of your labor!

Almond Crusted Chicken with Sweet Potatoes and Asparagus

1/2 cup whole almonds, chopped fine
1/2 cup Dijon mustard
2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts
1/2 pound asparagus, trimmed
1 large sweet potato, sliced into thin circles
Salt and pepper to taste

- * Preheat oven to 450 degrees and line a cookie sheet with parchment paper.
- * Chop almonds fine in a food processor.
- * Lay a piece of parchment paper on a flat surface. Sprinkle with chopped almonds.
- * Place pieces of chicken on a parchment lined cookie sheet.
- * Lay asparagus next to chicken. Place sweet potatoes next to asparagus.
- Lightly spray chicken, asparagus and sweet potato with olive oil and sprinkle with salt and pepper.
- * Bake for 10-13 minutes until chicken is firm to the touch and cooked through.


