Homeowners and Residents of Mountain View

Yesterday's HOA meeting was great! We had a wonderful turnout and noticeable interest in the upcoming election and political brouhaha that accompanies elections.

There was a change in the law, beginning January 2018, affecting a community like ours with regard to how political information can be disseminated. Previously, we were within our rights to say soliciting door to door was not allowed. Now, a resident who supports a particular candidate may distribute literature on that candidate by going door to door. Notice, I said a resident. Non residents are still not allowed to distribute literature door to door. Residents can also support a candidate and sponsor them with an event in our clubhouse. We have designed specific rules that apply to a political event, but it is allowed. The following is a summary of the adopted rules. Please know they may not be all inclusive but just a summary for your information. If you wish to sponsor a political event you will need to complete forms, etc.

HOA Board approval will be required.

An event cannot be before, after or during an HOA Board meeting.

Call Social Club Chair, Maggie Lawrence, at 909-268-3666 to arrange a date and time.

Next, Dan Klaas, at 951-247-5798, will provide the form to complete.

Dan will open the shed if your group needs additional chairs.

If there is enough lead time, it will be posted on the Newsletter Calendar as a Political Event. On the day of the event we will post a notice on the clubhouse door.

The HOA will do no other publishing of the event.

After your event you will need to return the clubhouse to its previous condition.

If cleanup is required by the Association after the event, the hosting member will be charged.

If there are outside guests, there can be no more than six guests per residence.

The reserving party will be responsible for the actions of the guests and attendees.

There will be a sign-in sheet for attendees.

Maximum occupancy rules for the clubhouse must be adhered to.

No alcohol is permitted.

The reserving party agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the Association, its directors, officers and agents from and against all claims, demands, or liability for any damage, loss, injury or death and any and all costs and expenses incurred by Association in connection with the use of the facilities.

Again, the above notes are only part of the requirements that affect the use of our clubhouse for a political event. This information is not meant to discourage the use of our clubhouse for political purposes, but to protect the members of our community that are all joint owners of this property.

One other political piece of information that came up was posting political signs. As long as they are a reasonable size, they are now allowed.

We hope this information is useful to you. Again, it is not all inclusive. The forms provided to interested residents will have an attached policy/legal opinion with more details.

It is nice to see our residents interested and getting involved in our city and the things affecting our community. When you show an interest in your community, it is an indication you care and can make a difference. Thank you for your participation.

DELINQUENCY STATUS REPORT:

As of August 31, 2018, there is a total of \$3,867.00 in delinquent assessments. This value represents an approximate delinquency rate of 1.08%, as compared to the last delinquency rate of 0.92% July 31, 2018.

COMMITTEE UPDATES:

Finance: We are looking for good CD rates for investment of HOA funds.

Social: There will be prizes for best costumes at Oct. TGIF. Craft Club will make bracelets Nov.17. Computer Class Nov. 10 at 10 am. Ladies Night will continue inside in cold weather. Chair person is needed for Crafts and Bid Wiz.

Landscape: Plantings in many areas are being reviewed now that weather has cooled.

Facilities: 3 video cameras were installed in the clubhouse. We are getting bids for redoing putting green area with cement pad, tables, and chairs. Gym equipment had minor adjustments. Pool light timings will be adjusted. Gate is fixed. Residents can call SCE or report street lights at sce.com.

Architecture (no update)

Communications: Newsletter Ad Revenue exceeding printing costs by 945.90 over the last 4 fiscal years was returned to the Social Club. We are now ahead by \$291 for this fiscal year which began August 1st.

Neighborhood Watch – There were complaints of underage occupants, people bringing glass objects to the pool, and dogs incessant barking. Speeding, however, appears to have subsided a bit.

Clubhouse Renovation: Selected vendors are being approved by BCS. Requirements seem pretty steep for small vendors.

We will replace the wall unit with a large credenza. Work with our interior designer is complete. Work can begin when all vendors are approved.

Fabrics, Formica, and frame finish for tables and chairs, as well as wood finish and quartz for bar and credenza, have been selected.

The Green Thumb Corner

Greetings Mountain View Gardeners:

October is traditionally a busy season in California. The nights become cool and nippy but the days are still very warm.

This is the ideal time of the year to plant almost anything. The exceptions are tropical and bare root plants. They should be planted in January as the cool weather encourages root growth. A larger root system leads to growth surge in the spring.

A number of beautiful perennials and annuals bloom in the fall or winter and provide color from autumn through spring. These annuals can be planted now: Pansies, Violas, Lobelia, Calendula, Cineraria, Cyclamen, Delphinium, Dianthus, Evergreen Candytuft (*Iberis sempervirens*), flowering cabbage, flowering kale, Foxglove, Iceland Poppies, and Sweet Alyssum. Planted early enough, given adequate water and fertilized lightly, these annuals will begin to bloom before Christmas. If you plant too late, they will not bloom until March or April and will die during the first hot days.

Consider a vegetable or herb garden. Generally speaking, plants grown for their roots or their leaves thrive during the cool season. Try planting lettuce, cabbage, carrots, radishes, or onions.

Divide overgrown Daylilies, Iris, Ginger, ornamental Asparagus and Clivia. Extra divisions may be planted elsewhere or given away to friends. When dividing irises and daylilies look for the natural divisions between the fans of leaves and carefully saw or pry them apart. Trim the leaves down to about 4 inches and replant. Also, divide Shasta Daisies, Gazanias, Ornamental Grasses, and *Dietes*, or "Fortnight Lilies." Fortnight Lilies are often mistreated by gardeners who shear their leaves causing disfigurement and browning. The best way to trim these plants is to dig and divide just as you would with Iris or daylilies.

Ornamental grasses are also pruned incorrectly. These summer bloomers should be cut within a couple inches of the ground at the onset of cold weather. This will prevent the "haystack" look.

Withholding fertilizer causes deciduous fruit trees to begin dormancy.

It is not advisable to fertilize Roses again until early spring.

Consider broadcasting wildflower seeds.

The best seed mix includes annual flowers, perennials and ornamental grasses.

October is a wonderful time to be outdoors. Enjoy working in your garden and the beauty it provides!

Rattle Those Pots and Pans From The Kitchen of Katie Wenke

Baked Mushroom Chicken

2 boneless skinless chicken breast halves

1/4 cup all-purpose flour

3 tablespoons butter, divided

1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms

½ cup chicken broth

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper

1/3 cup shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese

1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese

1/4 cup sliced green onions

- 1. Flatten each chicken breast half to $\frac{1}{4}$ in. thickness. In a shallow bowl, place flour. Dip chicken in flour to coat both sides; shake off excess.
- 2. In large skillet, brown chicken in 2 tablespoons butter on both sides. Transfer to a greased 11x7-in. baking dish. In the same skillet, saute mushrooms in the remaining butter until tender. Add the broth, salt and pepper. Bring to a boil; cook for 5 minutes or until liquid is reduced to ½ cup. Spoon over chicken.
- 3. Bake, uncovered, at 375 degrees for 15 minutes or until chicken is no longer pink. Sprinkle with cheeses and green onions. Bake 5 minutes longer or until cheese is melted.
