# **HOA BOARD LETTER**

Summer is coming to an end and we are ready for some fall weather!

The board has some unfinished projects in the works. The most important of these is the street "slurry", a project that will be done late September or early October. The board will have the "slurry" proposals (bids) at the August meeting and will announce our final decision to the community at that time. With regard to the work itself, residents will be notified as to dates and times by the contractor.

The common area lighting project is complete and it's "remaining life" value will be reset in our next reserve study.

Our other on-going renovation project is the landscaping that has been underway this last year. We have upgraded the watering systems and changed to more water-wise plantings. Phase 1 of this project is just now being completed. We will begin considering Phase 2 during the next year. Phase 2 should complete our long-term renovations and complete the renovations to our watering systems. Phase 2 will include the clubhouse parking lot slope, the Grandview common area slope and the pool and spa areas.

The on-going renovations are paid out of our reserve account and not out of the operating account. The board is required to maintain the common area properties at the standard of the community.

As President of the HOA Board, I received a call from the City of Moreno Valley regarding the 2010 Census. The city will be sending the board information regarding the redistricting of the 5 Council Districts. Once we receive this information, we will pass it on to the community. Also, Robin Hastings, our Moreno Valley District 3 Representative, will be holding a town hall meeting on Wednesday, September 21st, at Lago High School Vista Del "Commons" (aka multi-purpose room), 15150 Lassalle Street. "Meet & Greet" City Department Heads at 5:30 p.m. with Presentation and Q&A to follow at 6:00 p.m.

Please feel free to attend the HOA board meeting to discuss your concerns or questions on any of the above. Our next HOA board meeting will be SEPTEMBER 28th.

# Paula Deen's Best Peach Cobbler

\*\*I made this recipe with fresh peaches from my tree. It was so easy and everyone who tried it wanted the recipe and said it was the best they ever had. I did not change anything in the recipe so I am giving credit to the author: Paula Deen Happy Baking!!!!

# **Ingredients**

- 4 cups peeled, sliced peaches
- 2 cups sugar, divided
- 1/2 cup water
- 8 tablespoons butter
- 1 1/2 cups self-rising flour
- 1 1/2 cups milk

Ground cinnamon, optional

# **Directions**

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

Combine the peaches, 1 cup sugar, and water in a saucepan and mix well. Bring to a boil and simmer for 10 minutes. Remove from the heat.

Put the butter in a 3-quart baking dish and place in oven to melt.

Mix remaining 1 cup sugar, flour, and milk slowly to prevent clumping. Pour mixture over melted butter. Do not stir.

Spoon fruit on top, gently pouring in syrup. Sprinkle top with ground cinnamon, if using.

Batter will rise to top during baking. Bake for 30 to 45 minutes.

To serve, scoop onto a plate and serve with your choice of whipped cream or vanilla ice cream.

Yield: 8 to 10 servings



# GARDENER'S CORNER

Late September is the best time of the year in California. The soil is warm and the rainy season is coming (pray). The root systems will become established during the fall and winter and the plants are off to a fresh start next spring. Weed preventers...Now is the time to ad pre-emergent herbicide to your garden. You must apply a half-inch of water after applying the granular weed preventer. This treatment will be effective for six to eight months and will prevent the usual crop of weeds. This is good time to repair and generally care for the lawn, seed can be sown to replace new growth. Brushing, raking with a wire rake and spiking all help to improve penetration of air to the turf surface and the soil below. Follow this with a fall feed of a compound fertilizer high in potash and phosphate.

Bald parts of the lawn can be scratched up to provide some sort of seedbed and sown with a seed mixture which matches the grasses already present. Deadhead and feed your **roses** for the last time. Save heavy pruning for December or January. I buy **bulbs** now while the selection is best. Pick the fattest bulbs you can find, they are the strongest. Put tulips, crocus and hyacinth in the refrigerator in paper bags for 6 to 8 week before planting. Daffodils, freesia, sparixix and Dutch Iris will naturalize in our climate. When selecting new plants for your garden, carefully consider the ultimate size and shape you need in a plant. There are compact varieties of most popular shrubs. This is even more important with trees. Give a tree all the room it needs.
