Last night at the meeting we had many new faces. Thank you for coming. And a thank you to, (I won't say old, I will say regular) all of the regular attendees. We covered so much territory I won't be able to update everything, so I will try to touch on the topics that I think will be of interest to most of you.

Really important! Maggie Lawrence has come forward and agreed to be the Social Club Chair! Thank you, Maggie! With Maggie's commitment we will be able to maintain all of our regularly and irregularly scheduled events. We all need to give Maggie a big 'thank you' when we see her. Even though she is still a working woman, she is already making plans to keep us busy! If you have a few minutes or are particularly fond of a certain holiday, give Maggie a call and offer your help.

If you have been to the pool, workout room, or clubhouse in the last few days, you have seen the mess on the concrete. The palm trees were trimmed. Unfortunately, the same thing happened last year. Artistic Maintence is required to clean up this mess, as they were the ones who left it. Since this is not the first time this has happened, we are hoping they will devise a plan to keep it from happening in the future. It should be cleaned up within the next day or two.

One of the big topics of discussion was the renovation of the clubhouse. The Board met a few weeks ago to compile a list of needs. From the list of needs, the team will try to find solutions to address the needs. For example, we would like to have one continuous floor instead of the variety of tiles currently available. The team is working on getting bids and estimates on replacing the variety with one continuous type of tile, with carpeting only in the billiards room. We have a need for storage of games and certain Social Club supplies. The team will be considering removing the wall unit and replacing it with a large credenza. Above the credenza we could add a large 72 or 80 inch TV. These are just a few of the recommendations the team will be making to the Board, allowing the Board to make the final decisions. The funding for this huge undertaking will come from the reserves we have all been contributing to when we pay our homeowners dues. We will keep you posted with our progress. Progress will be slow, so hang in there.

Another item of great concern is showing movies in the clubhouse. Some time ago we put that activity on hold to seek a legal opinion about our liability. The opinion has come back and has caused other questions and concerns. A quote from the opinion, "Please note that the Assn. clubhouse is such a "public place" and a gathering of residents and/or occupants of the Assn. is "a substantial number of persons outside of a normal circle of a family and it's social acquaintances." So again, I concur with the Board's policy not to show movies in the clubhouse unless the Assn. pays for a license to do so." This opinion came from one of the attorneys on staff. We are now asking the opinion of the main partner of the firm since many residents feel that our clubhouse shouldn't be considered a public place. So stay tuned for more on this subject. At this point in time, the movies are still on hold because Board members don't want to be held liable for the potential fines.

As you can see, we had a productive night and will continue to have more. Thank you for your support.




Letters to the Editor

The Heroic Story of Lucca the Military Dog

In 2000, former President Bill Clinton signed a law whereby both retired military soldiers and civilians had the opportunity to adopt service dogs that had been so faithful during war. Since that time, several organizations have been founded to assist in bringing dogs back to US soil such as the Military Working Dog Team Support Association or MWDTSA and the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals or SPCA.

There is one dog in particular that has recently made headlines. Lucca, a half German shepherd and Belgian Malinois breed joined the United States Marine Corps in 2006 and has been hailed as a true hero.

At just two years of age, she completed extensive training to become a top search dog that would be used for a variety of military operations specific to open areas, roads, vehicles, and buildings in the effort to find ammunition, weapons, and explosives. For her first five years of service, Lucca worked with her initial handler, Gunnery Sergeant Willingham, but was then handed off to one of Willingham's teams working in Afghanistan, Corporal Juan Rodriguez.

Prior to March 2013, Lucca had already provided exemplary service during two Iraq tours of duty in 2007 and 2008 and one Afghanistan tour in 2011. Over that period, this service dog led more than 400 patrols, discovered countless explosive devices, and was directly involved with the apprehension of four insurgents, later determined to be Improvised Explosive Device or IED manufacturers that supported numerous terrorist cells in the region.

Lucca's final mission occurred on March 23, 2013 while out on patrol with her handler, Rodriguez, and several other Marines. Walking ahead, she indicated the presence of an IED. After being safely detonated, she continued her search for secondary explosives at which time a device went off causing severe burns to her chest and severely injuring her front left leg. Although in horrible condition and extreme pain, her first response was to run to her handler in an attempt to protect him as well as other Marines on the mission.

Immediately, a tourniquet was applied and proper first aid administered. Lucca was then airlifted to the unit's medical center where she was stabilized before being flown back to Germany and then onto Camp Pendleton. There, she underwent surgery to have her injured leg amputated and completed special physical rehabilitation. To no surprise of her handler or the other Marines whose lives she had saved, Lucca made a miraculous recovery. Lucca has since turned eight and now resides with her first handler Willingham and his family while enjoying a life of pampering and gratitude.



Salute to Peaches

On July 5th, 2017, we lost our little Maltese dog, Peaches. She was 14 ½ years old. She came to live with us in Mountain View when she was just two months old. She loved living here, chasing squirrels, rabbits and lizards even though she never caught them. Peaches was well known in our community, making her presence felt by barking at others as they passed by. She developed congestive heart failure and became very ill. She brought so much love, joy and happiness to our family and she is greatly missed.

The Green Thumb Corner By Victoria Klaas

Greetings, Green Thumbers!

We are nearly at the end of another long, hot Moreno Valley summer and at long last we can irrigate gardens without incurring punitive charges or feeling guilty.

There is much to do this month to prepare for cooler weather. Here is a list of activities and chores I have completed for the past forty years.

Pine trees stressed by drought are subject to a Pine Bark pest which can kill. Soak these trees deeply and check for browning of needles and excessive needle drop.

Late September and early October are ideal times to plant bulbs. Daffodils freely multiply and bloom with just a little rain water. Other choice bulbs are *Muscari* (Grape Hyacinth), Freesia, Crocus, Ranunculus, Cyclamen and Lilies. Lilies must be planted right away as the bulbs aren't truly dormant.

Tulips are beautiful but, unlike daffodils, the bulbs require refrigeration for a few weeks in order to produce quality flowers. Store them in the vegetable crisper and plant around Thanksgiving Day. While they will flower another year if left in the ground, the blooms will be quite small and inferior. It's better to regard them as annuals and simply buy new ones each fall.

Cheerful bulb beds can be created by planting low growing annuals like Sweet Alyssum, Lobelia or Violas. Bulbs will grow up through these and bloom most charmingly.

This is the last month to add tropical plants. Prune now and they will continue to grow through winter. In the spring they will be large, vigorous and ready to bloom again. Spring pruning will make them late to flower, or they may not flower at all.

Divide Irises and disbud Camellias. Disbudding enables plants to produce larger, showier blooms. Plant Sweet Pea varieties that bloom during short days. "Elegance," "Old Spice," and "Royal" are available at Johnny's Seed online.

Want a winter vegetable garden? In Southern California we can grow more vegetables in winter

than in summer. Generally speaking, if it is grown for its leaves or its roots, plant it in fall. This, includes lettuce, carrots, radishes, potatoes and even peas which are grown for their fruit.

Grasshoppers are migratory and remain difficult to control. There are products that can infect them with disease and baits to attract and kill them. Look for "Nolo," and "Semaspore" products.

Halibut with Crab Sauce

(Serves 4)

- 4 Halibut fillets (6 ounces each)
- 1⁄4 teaspoon of salt
- $^{1\!\!/}_{4}$ teaspoon of pepper
- 2 teaspoons plus 2 TBS butter, divided
- 3 teaspoons all-purpose flour
- ³/₄ cup reduced-sodium chicken broth
- 1/3 cup fat-free milk

1/2 cup crabmeat, drained, flaked and cartilage removed

1/4 cup shredded Swiss cheese

Place each fillet in an individual broiler-proof serving dish. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Melt 2 teaspoons butter; drizzle over fillets. Bake, uncovered, at 350 degrees for 15-20 minutes or until fish flakes easily with a fork.

Meanwhile, in a small saucepan coated with cooking spray, melt remaining butter. Stir in flour until smooth; gradually stir in the broth and milk. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 1-2 minutes or until thickened. Stir in crab. Remove from the heat; stir in cheese until melted. Pour over halibut. Broil 4-6 inches from the heat for 3-4 minutes or until lightly browned.

Beat together cream cheese, sour cream, sugar and vanilla.
